SYSTEM OF TIME HELD ALL WRONG

Present Arrangement a Delusion and Fraud, Says C. T. Higginbotham at Studebaker Civic Club Meeting.

Opening an interesting talk, with the assertion that time, as used by the people of the nations of the earth to regulate action and custom, was absolutely a delusion and a fraud, Charles T. Higginbotham, consulting superintendent of the South Bend Watch factory, entertained the members of the Henry Studebaker Civic club Tuesday night with an address upon "Universal Time."

"The time by which we regulate and set our watches and clocks," said Mr. Higginbotham, "conforms not the slightest to the movements of the earth and the other heavenly bodies by which it is supposed to be governed. Universal time, a standard by which all nations of the earth would have the same time at the identical hour, is the dream of scientists and governments."

Four Standards in U. S. "In the United States we have four degrees or standards of time. In China, a country as large in area and larger in population than the United States, there is but one standard of time, which is set from a single given meridian. We are ahead of China in everything else. Should we remain in the shadow in a question so momentous?"

Mr. Higginbotham went on to explain various systems in use in other countries for the measurement of time. He said that many methods by which dreamers had attempted to regulate the standard of time in the United States had failed through lack of proper backing and organization.

The club was also entertained by musical selections by Edward Kowalski, after which a light luncheon was served.

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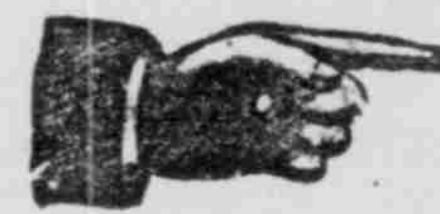
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Polly and Her Pals
