

Football Fans Anxiously Watch for Reports of Yale-Notre Dame Game

HOOSIERS AWAIT REPORTS OF TILT

South Bend Fans Are Showing Great Interest in Outcome of Notre Dame-Yale Contest at New Haven.

With every football follower in the country watching anxiously for the outcome of the Notre Dame-Yale contest at New Haven this afternoon, South Bend supporters of the gold and blue are fingering jingleless pockets and anxiously awaiting reports of the important conflict. Coach Harper's men, judging from the money that has been staked on them, have the confidence of the South Bend fans who are pulling with all their might for a victory to the credit of the Hoosier eleven.

The students at Notre Dame are receiving reports of the game by a special wire direct from the New Haven gridiron. Every play comes to the gymnasium at the university where hundreds of students are collected, listening to the story of the game as it ticks over the wires. Followers of the team in South Bend are collecting about the tickers and newspaper offices reading the results of the game as they are reported.

Football experts throughout the country have been giving the westerners the benefit of the doubt regarding the result of the Yale contest today and Notre Dame will more than give the eastern eleven a battle according to the reports. The Hoosiers play better away from home and, left determined to rout the Eli's from their position. But one factor the westerners must overcome today is the support of about 26,000 Yale enthusiasts who will be in the stands. But the defeat of the army last year has given the gold and blue confidence while their style of open play is expected to whip the Yale crew.

Much Interest. All interest in sport did not die with the departure of the football team for the Yale game, as spirited meetings of rooters were held every evening in the various halls to prepare for other contests, and the reception of the team when they arrive in South Bend Monday. The meetings are preceded by speeches from the various rooters. Last night one of the speakers called attention to the fact that the eyes of the whole country were being focused upon Notre Dame and its team. He drew attention to the fact that really it was no use to be a member of the so called big nine, when you were already considered the big one.

Another rooster was a "dopester" and had it all figured out. Harvard was to trim Michigan, Yale was to trim Harvard, and Notre Dame was to trim Yale in today's game and thus "winch the bunting".

Each of the halls have an individual cheer leader and a number of new songs and yells are being practiced daily. The next athletic contest will

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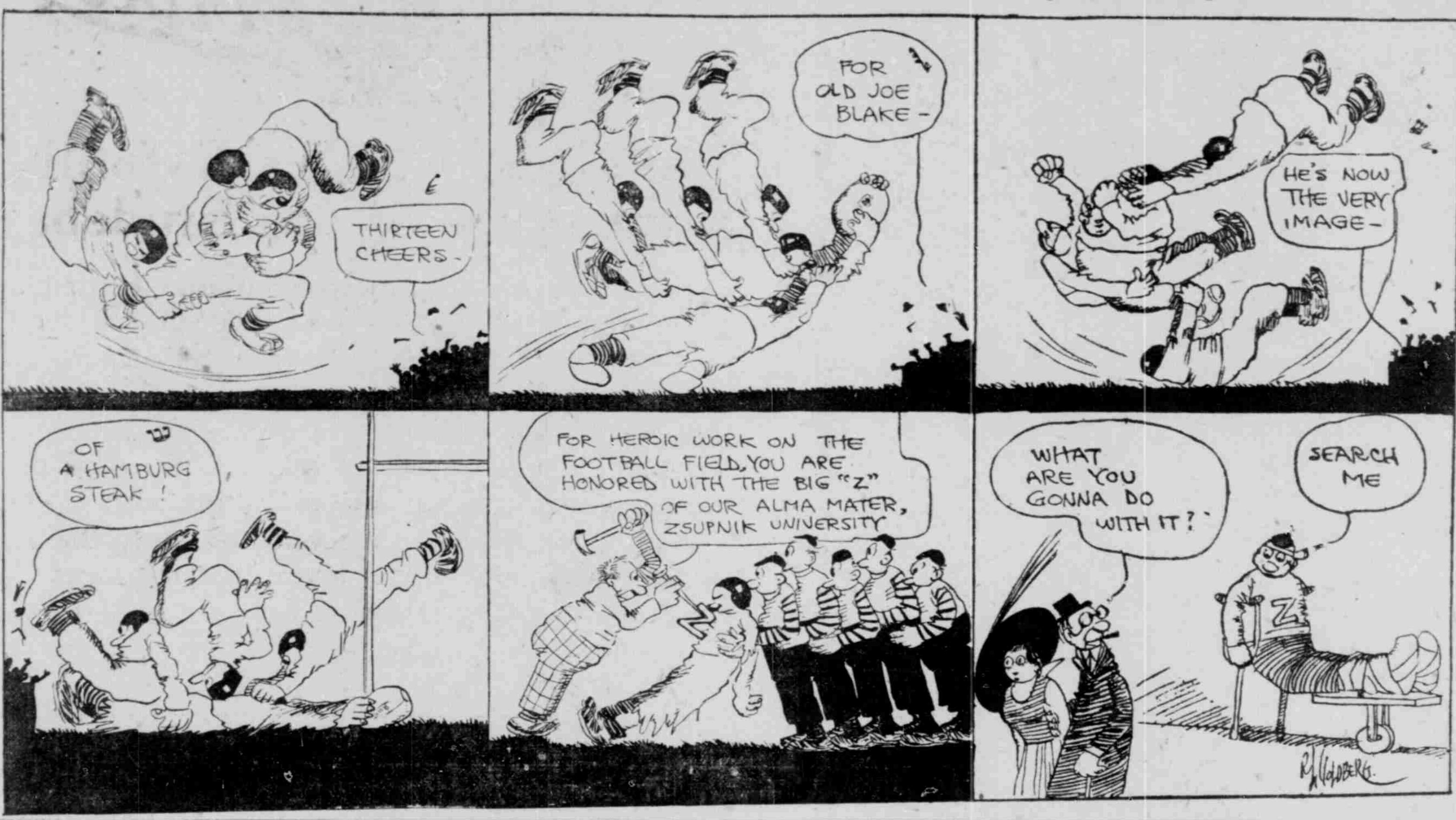

IMPORTANT GAMES ARE IN PROGRESS

Notre Dame-Yale Contest Most Vital on Eastern Gridiron But Purdue-Wisconsin Will be Most Interesting in West.

Chicago, Oct. 17.—The most important football game today for the east and west alike is the Notre Dame-Yale contest at New Haven. If Notre Dame should win, the Indiana school will lay claim to the American championship.

Experts concede that the Hoosier eleven has a chance on a dry field. Forward passes and other formations of the most open variety will be called into commission by Notre Dame, and unless Yale displays a stubborn defense victory will rest with the western team when the final whistle blows. Although Michigan is to meet Harvard at Cambridge on Oct. 31 in another game of inter-sectional importance, the result of today's battle at New Haven will have a bearing on the national title and the relative merits of eastern and western football.

Purdue at Madison. Eyes of western enthusiasts will be focused on Madison, where Purdue and Wisconsin, two undefeated conference eleven's, will clash in one of the most important mid-season struggles of the western organization. Last year these teams played a 7 to 7 tie at Lafayette and the game was one of the most bitterly fought of the big nine season. Although both eleven's have been weakened by the loss of various players, today's game should be just as bitterly fought as last season's battle.

At Stagg field the Iowa team will give Chicago university a hard fight. The Maroons on past records and form, however, outrank them. Northwestern will give battle to Indiana in another game of interest which will not have any bearing on the conference title. Both teams have been defeated this year.

Illinois will go into action against Ohio State at Urbana in a game which still has a contender for the conference title.

South Dakota Plays. "South Dakota will be Minnesota's opponent at Minneapolis in a game which should give the Gophers a hard test in preparation for their game with Illinois on Oct. 31.

Coach Yost will take his aggregation to Lansing to meet the Michigan Aggies in a struggle which should show the offensive and defensive strength of the team which will carry the standard of western football against Harvard, the eastern champion, on Oct. 31. The Aggies won from Michigan and Wisconsin last year and they are nearly as strong this season.

In the east Harvard will clash with Tufts at Cambridge. Dartmouth will meet Permont at Hanover. Pittsburgh will play the Carleton Indians at Pittsburgh. The Navy will meet Pennsylvania at Annapolis and Cornell will entertain Bucknell at Ithaca.
