INTERESTING PROGRAM FOR CLUB FEDERATION

Club Delegates Swarming Into
Evansville Face Busy Days
During Present Week.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Oct. 19.—Delegates to the annual convention of the Indiana Federation of Women's clubs swarmed into Evansville today from all parts of the state, and every indication points to a large and enthusiastic meeting beginning Tuesday forenoon and extending through three days.

Beginning with special meetings and the session of the credentials committee Tuesday morning, every available hour of the time that the visitors are in the city will be taken up with some sort of business gathering or social function until Saturday forenoon.

Two-minute reports by club presidents on "How has your club best served the community during the past year?" will be the feature of Tuesday afternoon's session. At 4 o'clock there will be an informal tea given by the Woman's Press club of Evansville.

The formal opening of the convention proper will take place Tuesday evening with Mrs. W. J. Torrence, chairman of the first district federation, presiding. Addresses of welcome will be responded to by Mrs. Samuel M. Ralston, Indianapolis, first vice president of the state federation. The annual address of the president, Mrs. Vida Newson, will be the principal feature of the first regular session.

Reports of Officers Wednesday. Reports of the state officers will be heard Wednesday forenoon, to be followed by reports of the various department chairmen. District chairmen will have the floor Wednesday afternoon, and Wednesday evening will be devoted to the annual "Federation dinner" at the St. George's hotel, followed by an elaborate program of music and greetings from

honor guests. Notably among the latter will be an address on "War and Peace" by Dr. William Lowe Bryan, president of the Indiana university.

After a steamboat ride on the Ohio river Thursday morning, the report of the credentials committee, Mrs. Carolyn R. Fairbanks of Ft. Wayne, will be heard. She will be followed by committee reports on various topics ranging from "pure food" to charities.

Thursday afternoon will be devoted to vital subjects, headed by "The great need of counting babies," by Dr. J. N. Hurty, secretary of the state board of health. Dr. Hurty has some advanced ideas on this subject which will prove highly interesting and edifying.

Will Discuss Constitution. Dr. Amelia R. Keller, president of the Franchise league of Indiana, will explain the "Need of a Constitutional Convention" at a "suffrage" dinner at the Walnut st. Presbyterian church. Reports of the resolutions committee by Mrs. Grace Julian Clarke, Indianapolis, chairman, and the reports of the auditor, Mrs. Sallie Harner Foster will constitute the important business of Friday.

A visit to New Harmony, Ind., on invitation of the Woman's Literary club will be the attraction for the delegates Saturday forenoon.

FORMER MAYOR ACCUSED

George H. Arnold of Adrian to be Tried This Week.

THREE RIVERS, Mich., Oct. 19.—A number of Three Rivers witnesses have been called to Grand Rapids this week where they will appear in the federal district court in connection with a suit brought by Michael Horigan, trustee in bankruptcy of William Rietz, a former business man of this city, against ex-Mayor George H. Arnold in which Horigan attempts to recover property claimed to have been fraudulently conveyed.

Rietz had been in business for some time and in 1908 he borrowed heavily and at the same time allowing his liabilities to pile up, owing one firm for goods purchased, over \$5,000 which was only an example of what Rietz really owed. When the crash came, Rietz quietly left town and the creditors made a grab for the property on hand.

DETROIT, Oct. 19.—Joseph C. Richardson, said to be a prominent merchant at Sault Ste. Coyne and Detective Lester Potter Saturday afternoon as a fugitive from justice. Richardson is wanted in the Canadian Soo on the charge of larceny of \$800 from the Dominion Sugar company, Wallaceburg, Ont., and the telegram on which he was arrested says he is wanted also on the charge of embezzlement, and several other charges of larceny. A warrant on the charge of stealing the \$800 will arrive in Detroit today.

SHOT, HE WALKS MILES

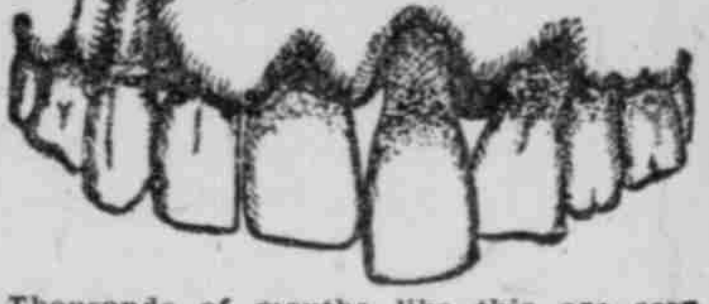
