

Former Gold and Tan Star is Leading Light of Indiana Eleven

WABASH TEAM IS HELD SCORELESS

Silver Edges Put Up Brilliant Defense and Gain Nothing to Nothing Tie in Tilt With State Champions.

The Silver Edge football team of this city, by holding the champion Wabash Athletic association football team at bay at Springbrook park Sunday afternoon and finishing 50 minutes of grinding football with never a tally against them, drove one more nail into their claim of state champions. The score of the game was nothing to nothing, neither machine being able to penetrate the defense of the other for a telling blow or a counter.

The lines of the two teams were the stone walls, with the exception of the last two quarters, when the locals weakened slightly at times and allowed the downstate backs to crash through for telling gains. Outside of that, neither team was better than the other and tight football was the rule throughout the game. It was one of the tightest and cleverest games seen in South Bend independent football circles for many seasons. The Scott, the doughty little halfback for the locals, and Smith, the Silver Edge quarterback, were easily the individual stars of the game. Manager Boinski worked hard at fullback and his crushing line backs netted the locals many yards. Big Schultz at guard also displayed wonderful talent at stopping the line backs of Adams, the husky Wabash full.

First Quarter.
The first quarter was marked with clever forward passes by each team. Wabash kicked to Smith who took the ball to the 30-yard line. Scott took the ball around right end for a pretty run of 10 yards. Vargo followed with 10 yards through tackle. After two gainless scrimmages, Vargo received a pretty pass from Smith for 10 yards. Wabash got the ball on a punt. They were held for two downs, and failed on a pass. Smith received their kick and put Vargo and Boinski through the line for five yards. Wabash held and Zilkey blocked their kick and recovered it. Smith's drop was blocked. Wabash was held for downs. Wabash blocked forward pass but H. Smith recovered before the ball hit the ground. The ball was on Wabash's 25-yard line as quarter ended.

Second Quarter.
Lower went in for Gruber. Wabash failed to gain for two downs. Scott blocking a pass in the second. Wabash was held and kicked to Smith. Vargo took five yards. After two downs the ball went to Wabash on a fumble. After a two yard gain around the end, the left half went through the local line for four yards. After the ball see-sawed back and forth for half of the quarter, Smith kicked over Adams' head and the ball rolled to the Wabash ten-yard line. Wabash recovered but failed to get in scoring distance of the local line. The ball was in center of the field at end of the quarter.

Third Quarter.
T. Meyers went in for Reiter. The quarter was a repetition of the other two. The ball was whipsawed back and forth with the scrimmages practically always in the Wabash end of the field. The locals were forced to extend themselves at the beginning of the period to guard against a score as the downstate aggregation pushed the ball with line plunges and long end run to the one-yard line. The Silver Edges held, however, and the quarter ended with the ball on the Wabash 40-yard line.

Fourth Quarter.
Adams opened the last period with a 20 yard gain through the Silver Edge line, which had weakened slightly. The locals were penalized for holding, after which Smith kicked and Boinski recovered on the Wabash 35 yard line. The Silver Edges tried hard to score but the Wabash eleven displayed remarkable defensive tactics and held them clear of the line. The ball was on the Wabash 25 yard line when the quarter ended.

Adams and Reno, fullback and left end, played the hardest games for the Wabash club. The latter was good

at any time for gains on around-the-end runs and was a sure tackler. Adams penetrated the local line time after time.

That the Western league suffered outright losses of \$12,500 last season through the depredations of the Federalists is the bald assertion of President O'Neill. Eight players, all of them drawing cards in the circuit, were lost to Gilmore's organization and all but three clubs in the Western parted with one favorite. The heaviest blow was struck when "Dutch" Zwilling, sold by St. Joe to the Boston Braves for \$5,000, turned down both clubs and cast his lot with Joe Tinker's Chicago Federals. The other losses ranged from \$1,000 to \$1,500 per man.

WHITAKER SHINES IN INDIANA GAME

South Bend Boy Leads Crimston to Victory Over Northwestern Saturday—Out-Generals His Opponents.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Oct. 19.—Frank Whitaker of South Bend high school fame, was the star of the Indiana Northwestern game Saturday at Bloomington, having led the Crimston to a 27 to 6 win over the Evanston team. Whitaker Saturday earned for himself the distinction of being one of the best quarterbacks ever seen on Jordan field.

He not only outgeneraled the opposing Methodists but he got away for long gains on straight-line plays and forward passes. Whitaker's best run was a 25-yard dash after receiving a forward pass when the ball was on Indiana's 35-yard line. With the ball back within scoring distance, Whitaker sent his team-mates down the field for Indiana's third touchdown.

On the defense the former tan and blue star was one of the big factors. Although the Crimston line was holding like the proverbial stone wall, there were many plays in which Whitaker, leading the secondary defense, dealt with the interference and stopped the man. On three different plays, Whitaker stopped the famous Hightower, the Northwestern quarter, twice throwing him for heavy losses on end runs.

Along with Whitaker on the Indiana eleven was "Dutch" Krause of Michigan City. These two Indiana players battled against each other in their high school days until athletic relations between South Bend and Michigan City were broken.

Had Great Season in 1911. Whitaker played his greatest high school game during the season of 1911, when the tan and blue went through the season without having their goal crossed and at the same time piling up a total of 151 points on their opponents. Whitaker at that time was considered to have been the best high school quarterback in the state.

In 1912 he burned things up on the Indiana freshman team in the following season went in as regular quarter on the varsity squad. His work at quarter on the varsity was fair, but he was considered to have been better material for a halfback.

With the coming of a new coach to Indiana, bringing with him the Yale style of play, Whitaker again appeared as a quarterback candidate and went better than ever before. On the backfield he is surrounded by the two Erehart brothers, Mickey and Archie, who played against Whitaker while starring on the Huntington high school team. The Erehart brothers play the halves and McIntosh handles the heavy line plunging at full.
