MAYOR ISSUES PROCLAMATION

In Behalf of Campaign For Funds For Belgian Orphans.

Mayor Ralph W. Gaylor has issued the following proclamation in connection with the drive for funds for Belgian children:

"Saturday will be 'Flower day' in Mishawaka. This is an occasion on which it is sought to raise funds to carry on a very necessary work among the thousands of Belgian war orphans. Queen Elizabeth of Belgium is personally directing this splendid work and all money raised goes into what is known as the Queen Elizabeth fund.

"The world owes a great debt to little Belgium for the heroic part she played in the great war. Under the leadership of her noble King Albert she refused to sell her honor when demanded to do so by Germany. Driven almost entirely out of her country it was truly said of Belgium that, though she lost almost everything material, yet she never lost her soul.

"Across the water there comes to us the cries of little children who must be fed and clothed. Thousands of children were ruthlessly torn from their mother's arms and sent away and today their identity is still unknown. The money raised from these flower sales is to care for these children and to carry on the work of identification in order that they may in the course of time be restored to their parents or near relatives.

"Our citizens responded generously in every war activity. Mishawaka is proud of its record. Let us not fail at this time to contribute freely to the aid of these little Belgian children who are the innocent victims of a cruel war. Thus may we in a measure give acknowledgment to the debt of gratitude we owe Belgium for the important part she took in the great world war, and at the same time contribute to a most worthy cause."

NEW HISTORY TEACHER HERE

Alvin C. Kibby Will Take Position Formerly Held by Robert Muncie.

Alvin C. Kibby, new head of the history department of the local high school, arrived in the city Friday morning. He comes from Jamestown, Ind., where he was superintendent of schools for the past six years.

Prof. Kibby is an instructor of much capability and experience. He obtained his A. B. degree in 1911 from the Indiana State Normal school and has had two summers of post graduate work in history and education at the University of Chicago. He started his career as a rural professor in Boone county, Ind., and was principal of a school in New Ross, this state, for two years. He was also principal of the high school at Dana, Ind., for one year and superintendent of schools at New Port, Ind., for two years.

Prof. Kibby succeeds Robert Muncie as director of the history department, and will have charge of the high school History club and the civic lectures to be given this year at the school.

Prof. Muncie has accepted a position at Kansas City, Mo.

REPORT RAINFALL FROM WHOLE STATE

By United Press: INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 1.—Rainfall has been reported by every weather station in Indiana during the last 24 hours. The precipitation varied from one-quarter of an inch to almost two inches with the average about half an inch. Showers were heavier in the southern half of the state than in the northern during this time, according to the weather bureau.

More water is needed for the crop, J. H. Armstrong weather bureau head, said. The rains were not of the ground soaking variety and did little more than give crops a new lease on life and lower temperatures from five to 10 degrees.
