

PROFITEERS ARE UNDER FIRE IN BRITAIN

Labor Leaders of Parliament Advocate Iron Hand in Fighting Price Gougers.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—British labor leaders today were demanding direct action against profiteers, immediate relief from the high prices and guarantees that no advance would be permitted in the future.

"I'd string up all persons who would take advantage of the sacrifices in blood made by the country," J. H. Thomas, Laborite, M. P., declared.

Jack Jones, another member of parliament, urged establishment of municipal markets as a remedy and hanging as a penalty for offenders.

"Limit profits to a pre-war basis," suggested J. B. Clynes, former food controller, while Benjamin Speer, a member of parliament, favored nationalization of essential industries.

"Send the profiteers and speculators to prison and tax excess profits 100 percent," advised Neil MacLean, M. P.

Fines are of no avail, according to Sir Alfred Yeo, M. P. who urged prison terms for hoarders.

Opposition to the proposed local tribunals was developing today.

"Small traders would be the largest of petty spites while the big offenders would get away unscathed," said Dr. Marion Phillips, members of the consumers' council of the food ministry. "The only cure for profiteering is national or preferably international purchasing with subsequent control over distribution."



WAR CAMP COMMUNITY SERVICE WILL ERECT MEMORIAL BUILDINGS

Decision to erect war memorials in the form of buildings to be social centers has been reached by 236 cities, towns and villages in the United States, figures just made public by War Camp Community Service show. The organization is carrying on a country-wide campaign for community memorials through its Bureau of Memorial Buildings. Reports in the offices of that bureau show that 450 other communities are considering the erection of memorial houses.

In hundreds of other cities, committees have been formed or are being formed to consider suitable memorials for the men who obeyed the summons to the colors. These new committees will be asked by the War Camp Community Service to put up community memorial houses instead of the old-fashioned stone and iron monuments which were so popular after the Civil and Spanish-American wars. The community memorial house, was camp organization workers say, forms a living memorial to the men who fought and died. It is the center of social activities of the community and constantly is a reminder of the men it was put up to honor.

GIRL SLAYS SELF AND SWEETHEART

Writes Letter to State's Attorney Asking Neighbor be "Hanged."

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—Police today sought persons who might have known of the love affairs of Gertrude Hoffman and John Lawrence—and others.

Lawrence and the girl are dead. She shot him to death yesterday and then took poison and hung herself on the floor near the man's body.

In a 20-page letter addressed to the state's attorney, she asked "Bob Aleff" hanged.

"He tarnished my life," she wrote. So last night police arrested Aleff, who lived near the girl's home. He stoutly denied knowing anything of the girl's love affairs, contending she "must have been insane."

The girl mentioned "others" in the

letter, including "a Chloris Todd, who lives at Pana, Ill., on a farm with the Simones."

Lawrence lived at Coraopolis, Pa. He was a steel worker.

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
