

'BULLS' COME AND HUNDRED LEAVE

Bartender Dumps Whisky in Water Trough When Detectives Raid Saloon.

"Here come the bulls," yelled a man Saturday night as Detectives Pallo, Hamilton, Delinski and Kozlowski entered the saloon of Adam Koscielski, 828 S. Cascade st., at which more than 100 men rushed from the store room, going out through windows and all other exits.

The bartender, who is said to be Frank Neiman, 442 S. Warren st., was arrested Monday morning and is being held in the city jail. When the police entered, they said, Neiman dumped a quantity of whisky in a trough behind the bar which is used for washing glasses.

One quart of whisky with a number of glasses which, the police say, were being used to serve drinks to the many men in the establishment, were taken in the raid, according to the police.

Koscielski will be tried in city court Wednesday by Judge Frank Gilmer on a charge of the unlawful possession of liquor with intent to sell. Deputy Pros. Schick will conduct the prosecution.

RECEIVE NO BIDS FOR DONOVAN ROAD PAVING

Although bids for the improvement of the Donovan rd., which extends from the end of the pavement on Notre Dame av. to the entrance to the Niles rd., were scheduled to be heard at the board of county commissioners meeting Monday not a single bid for the contract was received. The reason for their failure to receive any bids the commissioners believe was due to the low estimate cost of the improvement placed by them which was \$27,000.

The road will be again viewed during the coming week by D. Moonaw, county highway engineer, and three viewers to be appointed by the board and the report of this committee and a new estimate will be received. Bids will again be advertised. The commissioners expect to have this road completed before fall.

Bids for three bridges were ordered as advertised by the board. Two of these bridges are located in Marshall county. The specifications for the improvement of the Ear Trail were approved. Horace Feldman and Gladys Rline were awarded scholarships to Purdue university.
