

TO REMODEL HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

Rearrangement of Rooms Will Care For 1,200 More Vocational Students.

Five rooms in the south-east corner of the high school building, heretofore used as class rooms, will be remodeled for use in handling vocational work. It was decided at a meeting of the board of education, held Tuesday night. The locker rooms on the first floor of the building will be made over into class rooms, and the lockers will be moved out into the corridors of the first and second floors.

Further class rooms to take the place of those vacated in the basement will be arranged by converting the present library into two rooms, equipped with desks, while the library will be enlarged and moved into the girls' study hall.

A great saving in money is thus made possible, it was pointed out by W. W. Borden, superintendent of schools, Wednesday morning, when he announced the changes. It had been suggested that an annex be built to accommodate the vocational training, since 1,200 children will be added to the department under the recent state law.

To Move Wolfe's Office.

Changes in the school administration building will include the transfer of F. E. Wolfe, municipal director, from his present office location at the entrance to the building to the rear rooms. Adjoining Mr. Wolfe's office rooms will be the offices of the garden director. In the front of the building and in the office now used by Mr. Wolfe will be located an assembly room, where Supt. Borden will conduct his departmental teachers' meetings and where Mr. Wolfe will conduct the civic federation meetings.

Miss Ada Hillier, superintendent of home economics, will have her offices in the basement of the high school building. Three rooms will be occupied by this department. Vocational work for girls will also be conducted besides the sewing and cooking courses.

Miss Helen Bernbach, who has had charge of the junior placement department heretofore, will have charge of vocational guidance of all girls that may be reached. She will also have charge of the placement bureau and will be employment supervisor.

To Handle School Books.

The board also decided to handle the grade school books through its office. A room in the administration building will be devoted exclusively as a store room for all the books being used in the city grade schools. Five teachers for the city schools for the coming year were appointed at the meeting. They are: Amey Aicher, Michigan City, Ind.; Ruth Snyder, Helen Ayres and Una Camp of South Bend, and Wanda Bunday, also of Michigan City. According to Mr. Borden two vacancies for teachers in the high school and 11 vacancies for the grade schools remain to be filled.

Otho Osborne and George Weber were appointed directors of the night school. The fall term of this school will start the first week in October.

BLACKSTONE THEATER TO AWARD CONTRACTS FOR BUILDING TODAY

Contracts for the construction of the Blackstone theater corporation will be awarded today according to information received from officials of the concern. A number of local contractors have placed their bids for the work which will cost about \$275,000. Leases on the site where the theater will be located have been surrendered and work will commence on the erection within a few days. The building was designed by Henry Newhouse of Chicago. Officials state the house will be completed by Christmas and are planning for a big attraction in grand opera for a Christmas opening. The auditorium, which will be one floor, with no balconies, will seat 2,500 people. Pictures and opera of metropolitan style will be shown at the house at popular prices. A 25 piece orchestra will be engaged to furnish music along with the three manual organs.

Joe Alby Stands Off Squad Of Bluecoats, Capitulates To Single-handed Civilian

Joe Alby, ex-South Bend policeman, was fined \$1 and costs in city court Wednesday morning on a charge of being intoxicated. Asked by the court where he got the liquor, Alby said that he had got it in Niles.

Joseph Alby used to be on the South Bend police force. That may be the reason a blue coat and brass buttons don't frighten him. Or again, it may account for the tender respect in which Alby still seems to be held by the local police. Joe stood off four "bluecoats" last night, "bluecoats" who went into action inspired by the presence of their aide and mentor, the president of the board of safety, Dr. Louis J. Smith. But in spite of that, they failed, dismally, and but for the timely intervention of a civilian the quartet would have been routed completely, by a single "dunk" whose main weapon was profanity.

This is how it all happened. Alby entered the north Kable restaurant Tuesday evening as a patron. He made his wants known, however, in such an abusive manner and with so much profanity, that the manager, who was in the room, departed, and Alby still lorded it over his pre-empted table. Presently the two patrolmen returned with two comrades—a sturdy

quartet. In the meantime a goodly audience had assembled in the street, attracted by the presence of the patrol and the scent of trouble. Towering above this surging crowd, surveying the scene of action from the vantage point of an automobile seat, and looking very redoubtable, stood Dr. L. J. Smith, the safety board president.

Followed another colloquy inside between the four patrolmen and their intended quarry. "Come on Joe, you better come along," said the tenor, and was joined by the other three in chorus. Joe indicated with renewed vehemence that he intended to do nothing of the sort until he had leeburly satisfied the cravings of his inner man.

The quartet was hard put. What to do? The "big boss" was looking on, and they were about to fail before his very eyes. Then came a happy thought. An S. O. S. call was sent for "Goat" Anderson, whose place of business is near by. Presently "Goat" edged his way through the crowd of "bluecoats."

"Come on, get out of here, Joe," said "Goat," and seized Alby by the arm, propelling him forcibly toward the door, the while "Goat" remonstrated both vocally and physically, but to no avail. As "Goat" shoved him through the door one of the redoubtable coppers grasped Joe's free arm gently, assisting him to the waiting automobile, thus lending a timely aid which did not go unnoticed by the assembled crowd. Fearing for the safety of this intrepid officer, the spectators offered considerate warning by shouting, "Look out, there, he might hit you," and similar bits of solicitous advice.

But nothing so untoward developed. Alby was safely stowed in the black Maria and driven in the direction of the bull pen. And that gave "Doc" Smith a chance to sit down and take a rest.

TWO MOTORISTS LEARN ANTI-SPEED CAMPAIGN IS ON IN SOUTH BEND

The first move in his promised drastic campaign against speeders in South Bend was taken by Judge Gilmer in city court Wednesday morning when he fined Harry Smith, 517 S. He also impressed upon them the peril they themselves are under if they are haled into court on the charge again. Albright was fined \$5 and costs, suspended.

APPLES EXPECTED TO SET NEW PRICE RECORD

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 13.—This is an off year for apples and because of light production except in irrigated sections of the northwest prices will set a new record. Such is the substance of discussions at the opening session today of the International Apple Shippers' association. Seven hundred members are present from all parts of the globe. Charles M. Simons, London, said England has a fairly large crop but it will need aid of the American and Canadian supply to meet its needs. The English apple crop consists mostly of cooking apples; the country must import its eating varieties. The talks indicate as much variety in subject matter as the apples on exhibit.
