

BRITAIN GUARDED IN TROUBLE ZONES BY MILLION MEN

Tommies Uphold England's
Prestige in All Parts
of Globe.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—There are 675,000 British soldiers scattered abroad upholding the prestige of the British empire.

Nearly two-thirds of this force is retained to enforce the fulfillment by Germany of the peace treaty. This huge army does not include British soldiers in Ireland or other portions of the British Isles numbering over 300,000; hence the British army totals about 1,000,000 men.

206,000 Along Rhine.
In the British army of occupation along the Rhine are 206,000 soldiers, while in France and Flanders, forming the communication services and clearing up the battlefields are 214,000 men, who would act as a reserve for the Rhine army in case of need.

In Italy there are about 11,000 troops, most of them engaged in "clearing up" work. One battalion forms the British portion of the international garrison at Fiume.

In the Black sea area there are 44,000 troops, about a division being in the region of Constantinople and 22,000 in the Caucasus, where highly valuable oil fields are being guarded.

In Egypt and Palestine there are 96,000 British soldiers. As it well known a large garrison is being kept in Egypt to prevent revolution and Turkey-German plots coming to a head. Asia Minor is very unsettled; there's trouble between the Kurds and Armenians, which, with the dissatisfaction of the Turks, makes it necessary for a considerable force to be kept in Palestine, for which Great Britain has the mandate.

In Mesopotamia there are 21,000 British garrison troops. The Kurds there have been stirring up trouble. Central Arabia also is inclined to be war-like, mostly of tribal kind between sects.

India is Restive.
In India, where there are a million natives trained to arms, but who have been demobilized, the British garrison numbers 62,000. Unrest in India itself, together with punitive expeditions now and then by the Afghans, makes this force essential to continuance of British rule.

In Siberia, where international troops are guarding the Trans-Siberian railroad from the bolsheviks, there are 1,400 British troops. In addition there is a military mission designed to aid Admiral Kolchak, with headquarters at Vladivostok.

In North Russia, where the British policy is to hold the bolsheviks in check while Russians are being trained and equipped so they can "carry on," there are some 15,000 British troops, most of which are near Archangel. The British forces are gradually being brought home.

In addition, there are 6,000 British troops in defended ports of the British empire abroad. These ports include Gibraltar, Hong Kong, Singapore, Bermuda and Malta.

MOONSHINERS SHOOT DEPUTY STATE OFFICER

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Aug. 13.—Deputy Will Farley, of the state prohibition department, was shot and killed by three moonshiners as he lay in bed at his home on Dart's creek, near here, Monday night, according to reports received here Tuesday afternoon by W. S. Hallinan, state prohibition commissioner. Farley's wife who was asleep in the bed was uninjured.

The shooting followed a raid by Farley and Deputy G. S. Johnson Monday afternoon. The officers seized a still and took it to Farley's home. According to reports here, the moonshiners later went to the Farley home broke in and opened fire as Farley lay asleep. Johnson, who was in another room, fired at the assassins but they escaped.

A posse was organized early Tuesday and started in pursuit of the moonshiners who are believed to have fled toward the Kentucky border.

GRANT WAGE INCREASE.

OWENSBORO, Ky., Aug. 13.—Elwood Brackett, a negro boy residing at Harrisburg, Ill., who sues by his next friend, Peyton Ruby, has filed a \$20,000 damage suit in the United States court in this city against J. E. Shaver, Arthur Lile, Morton Lile, R. O. Pace, W. C. Klimmel, B. H. Roush, J. C. Stokes, Ernest Nolan, Earl Everly, O. N. Demp-

sey and Simon P. Miller, all well known and prominent officials and citizens of Greenville, Muhlenberg counties, Kentucky. It is alleged in the petition that while Brackett was confined in the jail at Greenville during the month of November, 1912, all of these defendants jointly entered the jail and assaulting each other in assaulting, beating and bruising Brackett to such an extent that he suffered great horrors and pain, and that his body has been permanently injured. Brackett claims that he was making no resistance or attempt to escape from jail, but that the men placed a rope around his neck, and while beating, assaulting and sweating him, they also threatened him with death.

STATE OFFICIALS AIDED IN FIGHTING PROTEFTERS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 13.—Discovery Tuesday of an old statute which permits county prosecutors to subpoena witnesses and take their sworn statements upon evidence of the commission of a felony or misdemeanor Tuesday gave new impetus to the efforts of state officials in the fight against the high cost of living.

The statute was unearthed by State Attorney General E. C. Stansbury following a conference with Gov. Goodrich and Dr. H. E. Barnard, federal food administrator for Indiana. The conference had been called by the governor to determine if there was some definite way in which evidence could be collected. Under this statute (sec. 940, Burns' revised statutes, 1912), county prosecutors will be enabled to collect sworn evidence of profiteering and hoarding without waiting for formal charges to be preferred against persons suspected.

The governor announced Tuesday evening that he would furnish the attorney general's department, from the governor's contingent fund, finances with which to assist county prosecutors in their fight against unreasonable profits and also that he would provide revenue from the same fund to defray the expenses of the state food administration in giving publicity to margins of profit on staples.
