

## ASSERTS BRITAIN MUST KEEP NAVY

Says Future of Empire Depends on Maintaining Sea Supremacy.

SYDNEY, Australia, Aug. 14.—Admiral Viscount Jellicoe preached a policy of preparation for war in some of the speeches he has delivered here while visiting Australia to inform the Australian government concerning matters of naval policy. "When discussions take place on such subjects as the League of Nations or the question of limitation of armaments, I trust it will never be forgotten that the existence of the British empire depends absolutely upon the safety of its sea communications," said Viscount Jellicoe at Sydney, where he addressed the Navy League. Before the war, he said, Great Britain suffered from a lack of sufficient ships to guard the long lines of communication between London and Australia, and he added, "It is up to the British empire to see that we are never in want of sufficient policemen afloat in the future."

Speaking of the "deadly risks run in the last five years," the admiral said, "one can only hope that in the future sufficient provisions will be made both by the mother country and by the overseas dominions to insure the impossibility of defeat of the British navy."

After giving some information to show how long it took Great Britain to prepare for Germany's submarine campaign, Viscount Jellicoe said: "The lesson I am trying to preach is preparation for war. I would like to say very seriously that it seems to me the conclusion is forced upon us that the British empire depends now more than ever upon naval supremacy."

## Champion Egg Eater is Now in Dispute

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 14.—S. G. Scott of this city, is hurt over the report that a Pennsylvania man claims to be the champion egg eater of the world just because he got on the outside of forty-eight eggs in twenty-four hours. Scott is a veteran of the Civil war and declared that on a wager in his younger days he ate forty-seven eggs at one sitting and when asked to eat another to make it four dozen scornfully replied that he didn't want to make a hog of himself. "The doctors who say there is as much nourishment in an egg as a pound of beefsteak give me a good sized pain," declared Scott. "Just suppose I had eaten forty-seven pounds of steak at that one sitting?" Scott says his opponent devoured thirty-seven eggs during the hour's contest.

## TWO FOOD CONCERNS INDICTED AT TOLEDO

TOLEDO, Ohio, Aug. 14.—Two food concerns among six individual dealers were indicted by the county judge here Wednesday as the first result of an investigation that has been under way nearly two weeks. The indictments charge membership in an unlawful trust to control trade and prevent competition. The grand jury investigation is being continued.

War risk insurance bureau officials are enlisting the cooperation of five hundred thousand volunteer workers to present to service men the benefits to be derived from continuing their war risk insurance. The government sells this insurance to the service men at cost, which is about one-third lower than it can be purchased from the old-line companies. The government pays all the expense of operation, giving the service man the protection at cost as one way of showing its appreciation for their war service. Forty billions of such insurance held by four million men will have a profoundly beneficial effect on the social and economic life of the nation.—Washington Post.

## Messengers Disappear With \$223,000 Liberty Bonds

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Liberty bonds valued at \$223,000 were stolen Tuesday from two brokerage firms in the financial district here, it was learned at police headquarters late Wednesday. The stolen bonds in each instance had been entrusted to messengers, who have disappeared.

Richard Whitney & Co. were the victims of the larger theft. This firm dispatched a messenger with \$178,000 worth of bonds to the

offices of Kidder, Peabody & Co., brokers, across the street from the Whitney offices. The bonds consisted mostly of Victory notes, although among them were some of the earlier issues. The messenger, a boy, did not deliver the bonds and the police are searching for him.

The other theft was from Simmons & Slide, whose loss totaled \$45,000 in Liberty bonds of the second issue.

## AUTO TRUCK IS USED AS 'WELL BABY CLINIC'

Fitted out as a model "well baby clinic," a big gray automobile truck known as the "Child Welfare Special" has been put into the field by the children's bureau of the U. S. department of labor. A government doctor and nurse are with the truck to examine children and give mothers advice concerning the necessary care to make and keep them well. The truck's first tour was in Illinois, where the attendants were almost overwhelmed by the crowds of mothers, fathers and babies. The plan brings child-welfare lessons to residents of rural communities who cannot well otherwise be reached.
