

NEW AND WATSON DON'T HELP CUT COST OF LIVING

G. O. P. Callous on Subject of
Profiteers and Burdens
of People.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—While everyone in Washington official circles is striving to find some method of solving the high cost of living, Sens. New and Watson of Indiana are giving negative assistance. They are vetoing proposals and by the process of elimination, eventually there may be offered some suggestion which will meet with their satisfaction. At the present time, they are not in accord with any of the recommendations of the president except that which they believed struck at the demands of labor.

The licensing system to control the distributors of foodstuffs is not favored by either Watson or New. They believe it will restrict business and rather than permit any such restriction they would see the present high living costs continue. They are among the most pronounced opponents of any restriction even upon the distribution of foodstuffs.

The attitude of Watson and New is being reflected in the leadership in the house. Republican floor leaders are insisting there is no necessity for continuing the present session of congress. They imply at least that the high cost of living is not worthy of consideration by congress and even state in bold language that there is more necessity for a vacation for the members of the house than there is for the consideration of legislation before congress.

Policy of "Nothing Doing."
Rapidly there is growing the policy of doing nothing and hoping to improve the party position by asserted mistakes of the opponents. The republican party leaders took this policy as their own throughout the war and then accused the president of making of congress a "rubber stamp." They are now preparing the way, in fact they already have prepared it, whereby they can only continue their "rubber stamp" practice and only because they are unwilling to become other than a rubber stamp.

Every suggestion from the white house that congress has the opportunity to assist in the solving of the great reconstruction problems has brought the immediate response from congress that the president was trying to "pass the buck." No statement has been made appreciating the courtesy of the president in asking for the co-operation of congress and no one has arisen to give him credit for such a policy. Instead there has been a nasty insinuation of an attempt to shift the responsibility.

Odium On Hays.
The congressional attitude created a fine situation for a president with moral courage and immediately the president grasped the opportunity and prepared for action. He made it plain to the people that first he had called upon congress for assistance and having been denied that he took the responsibility upon himself and was ready to be the leader he has always been. Any solution that comes now must be to his credit for he pointed the way to reduce the high cost of living. And if congress does not join and pass legislation in harmony with his position it will be the error of congress and an error which will be fatal for the republican leadership.

It is this example as well as others of an entirely incapable leadership which is causing the great independent and republican newspapers of the east to demand that a new deal be had in congress. It is this emergency which is calling for the presence of Will H. Hays in Washington but the unwillingness of Hays to assume the position of leader of his party and to permit Sen. Penrose to dictate party policy has brought an odium upon his administration which may be the cause for his failure to put in an appearance now.

STELLA TALBOT IN "THE PRICE OF INNOCENCE"

Monoplane to Try Transpacific Flight

TRANS-PACIFIC WHITE MONOPLANE

PROPOSED ROUTE, WHITE MONOPLANE TRANS-PACIFIC FLIGHT

Within a few months, according to an announcement in the last issue of the Aircraft Journal, an attempt to fly across the Pacific will be made in a White monoplane with two pontoons. The route selected is from Los Angeles, Cal., to Shanghai, China, by way of Victoria, B. C.; Sitka, Alaska; Aleutian Islands; Petropavlovsk, Kamchatka and Yokohama, Japan. The longest hop, 1,500 miles, will be made from Unalaska to Petropavlovsk; the next longest, 1,400 miles, from Petropavlovsk to Yokohama; the next, 1,200 miles, from Sitka to Unalaska. The total distance of the flight will be about 7,000 miles. It is expected that the flight will take three days as against three weeks by the fastest steamer.

Operate on Man Injured Nearly Thirty Years Ago

HARTFORD CITY, Ind., Aug. 14.—Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Short have returned from Rochester, Minn., where Mr. Short recently underwent an operation which was regarded as unusual by the specialists. His trouble was an aneurism or ruptured artery, caused by having been accidentally shot in the neck by a playmate 30 years ago.

The bullet nicked an artery and vein, allowing the blood to flow gradually into the vein from the artery and causing a large lump to form on his neck which had almost doubled in size during the past year, and which had been called a goitre by physicians.

The operation was a delicate one, the ends of the artery and vein having to be tied. An X-ray examination of the neck showed the bullet was still imbedded, but it was not removed, because the surgeons believed it would cause no trouble.

ENTIRE BUSINESS BLOCK OF TOWN IS BURNED

PIREVILLE, Ky., Aug. 14.—The entire business section of Heller, a mining town in southern Pike county, Kentucky, was destroyed by fire Wednesday. The postoffice, a theater, three grocery stores, a restaurant, and several residences were destroyed. Electric wiring is believed to have caused the fire. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.

NEW PRISON COMMANDANT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Major General James H. McCrae, former commander of the 78th national army division, was detailed Wednesday as commandant of the army disciplinary barracks at Fort Leavenworth, Kans., succeeding Col. Sedgewick Rice. Gen. McCrae recently was placed in command of Camp Travis, Texas.
