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are wrong. The mission of government is to safeguard liberty while the citizen takes care of himself. "This major premise being admitted, it follows logically and irresistibly that the government should discharge no function that the citizen can reasonably perform."

"We have the best form of government known to man. This is a republic. We have representative government. The people do not rule en masse. We choose our rulers. We pursue the middle course of safety."

"We have also pursued the wisest policy of any government in the world. The United States of America was not organized as a business concern, but as a liberty institution. The government has no business in business. And hauling freight and passengers for hire is the greatest business proposition in which Americans have ever engaged."

No Longer Experiment. Mr. Shaw then stated that government ownership and operation of railroads was no longer an experiment and a process to cite incidents in the future. The figure used by Mr. Shaw were later challenged by Dr. Zuehlbin. In continuing, he said:

"There are three essentials to successful business—capital, labor and management. No farmer ever lifted a mortgage by hard work. Mortgages are lifted by hard work, plus management when management is not sufficiently good, less labor is required. No republic has ever been able to secure the third and all essential element, management. Labor can be obtained for a satisfactory wage. Capital can be had with approved security, but management is not obtainable in the market places. In government service promotions are made in course and are based on length of service, seldom on efficiency. To promote for efficiency is to invite the charge of political favoritism."

"In private business a man will be discharged unless he is doing a good job, but in government service men are discharged only for something they have done. Self preservation is the first law of life in government service as elsewhere and for this, if for no other reason, no government official will assume a responsibility which will exercise of which will bring no reward, and where a mistake regardless of intent means criticism, sometimes investigation with its accompanying disgrace, and not infrequently, discharge, if for no other reason to save the man higher up."

Dr. Zuehlbin, in the afternoon address, characterized the peace treaty with Germany as "an abominable makeshift, which cannot be enforced." One redeeming feature, he pointed out, is the fact that it says to the world, "Don't start anything."

Dr. Zuehlbin made use of a map of the land hemisphere to show that it is, and always has been, the situation of a country with regard to the great highways which has determined its supremacy.

In brief, Dr. Zuehlbin said: "If westward the star of empire takes its way, what is to be the direction of world progress when imperialism comes to an end? The history of commerce is the history of Phoenicia, Greece, Rome, Spain, Portugal, the Netherlands, Britain. There it reaches its climax. For several hundred years Britain has been mistress of the seas. In 1855, the United States was threatening its supremacy; but Britain's iron ships and our civil war put us out of the running until the devastation of the world war gave us our new chance. In 1914 Germany was threatening the markets even of the British colonies. In the world war Germany committed commercial suicide. Dominates North Atlantic."

If Britain's position seems no longer so clear, she still dominates the north Atlantic ocean and this ocean is the contemporary Mediterranean sea. Nothing can ever take away the domination of the world by the peoples surrounding the north Atlantic ocean. If this domination is maintained by imperialism it means perpetual war; if by democracy it insures the just organization of the world.

The freedom of the seas cannot be threatened in war if there should be another war it would recognize no laws. Whatever else is done to avoid an infinitely more devastating war than the last one, we must have freedom of the seas in peace. This means that all strategic waterways shall be under international control—not only the Dardanelles and the Kiel canal but the Suez and Panama canals. Until we are ready to pay this price we are imperialists, inviting war."

Need Free Seamen. "Freedom of strategic waterways must be followed by extending to all seamen the freedom now enjoyed by American seamen. It will need also the extension of the International Postal union to insure world control for all international transportation. Until these things are done, doubtless an international navy will be necessary. But when the freedom of the seas is guaranteed, the sovereignty of all nations will be as secure as that of Canada and the United States, which need neither forts nor navies for protection against each other."

CENTRAL UNION FILES PETITION FOR BOOST IN TELEPHONE RATES

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 16.—Petitions asking for general increases over present telephone rates established by Postmaster Gen. Burleson in June were filed with the public service commission by the Central Union Telephone company for thirty-one Indiana cities Friday.

In general the increases range from ten to twenty per cent, although in some instances the increases asked are greater.

The proposed rates for individual phone service include: South Bend business, \$8; residence, \$3.25; Muncie and Anderson, business, \$5; residence, \$2.75.

The Citizens Telephone company of Dunkirk and the Eastern Indiana Telephone company also are petitioners for increased rates.
