WESTERN TEAMS MAY BE CHAMPS

Results of Last Week Show New York Clubs Nearly Out of Race.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Virtual elimination of both New York teams last week in the National and American league pennant races leaves the field clear for western clubs to compete for the honor of meeting in the world series. After losing four of its six games with Cincinnati, the New York Nationals to overcome the Red lead of six games would now have to win 26 of their remaining 40 games of the season, while the Reds need to win only 17 of their 34, a respective record of .650 and .500. New York's percentage of victories today is .626. In the younger league, Chicago, which stepped staidly last week, has a lead of eight and one-half games over New York, which held to fourth place by defeating Cleveland. In the National, Cincinnati batted lightly early in the week, and broke even in two games with Philadelphia. In the six games with New York, four of which were decided in the first inning, each team scored a total of 18 runs. New York made 47 hits to Cincinnati's 46, but the Reds made only nine errors to the Giants' 14. Ruether, Sallee, Eller and Fisher of Cincinnati won their battles, while Ring lost a 14-inning duel with Toney. Redder found that outfielding had doubled his skill on the mound. Barnes of the Giants, with 10 straight victories to his credit, lost to the Reds. Ruether shut out Brooklyn Saturday, but Smith of the Superas let the Reds down by allowing three hits and no runs Sunday.

Inability to hit the ball cost Chicago several games last week. Alexander won over New York and Brooklyn, allowing each team four hits and no runs. Vaughn beat Brooklyn in a close game, but was batted out Saturday by the Giants.

First League To Start.

While nearly all of the leagues in the city are making preparations to get under way the first organization to inaugurate its schedule season is the Wilson Bros. league. They will face the starters flag at the Orpheum alleys, Aug. 26. For the past three years this league has consisted of four clubs but this season it will be increased to six clubs.

Last year the Oliver league was the largest organization in the state, having a membership of sixteen teams. During their canvas of reorganization for the ensuing season they find there are twenty teams, who made application and are ready. As this league likes to play all of the games on one evening a serious situation confronts them as there is not an establishment in the city, which can accommodate that number at the same time.

The Studebaker club, which conducted two leagues of ten teams each for the past two years, will again be in the field this season. The same situation prevails as in the Oliver league, too many applications for membership. Consequently they are not in a position to announce their plans for the ensuing season.
