## POST OFFICE TO OPEN SHOP TODAY

Postmaster Will Take Orders for Groceries and Meats—Price List.

Housewives of Mishawaka will be given an opportunity during the next three days of purchasing government foodstuffs at 40 per cent less than they are paying for the same articles at the present time. Postmaster Herzog has secured a generous allotment for distribution in Mishawaka, and, beginning this morning, will take the names of any of the citizens who may wish to avail themselves of this opportunity. The orders will be forwarded to Mishawaka by parcel post which will add but a trifle to the cost. It was stated Sunday that some of the grocers were planning to purchase large quantities of the food to retail at higher prices, but no such opportunity will be afforded them, according to officials interested.


Here is a list of the articles allotted to Mishawaka along with the prices:

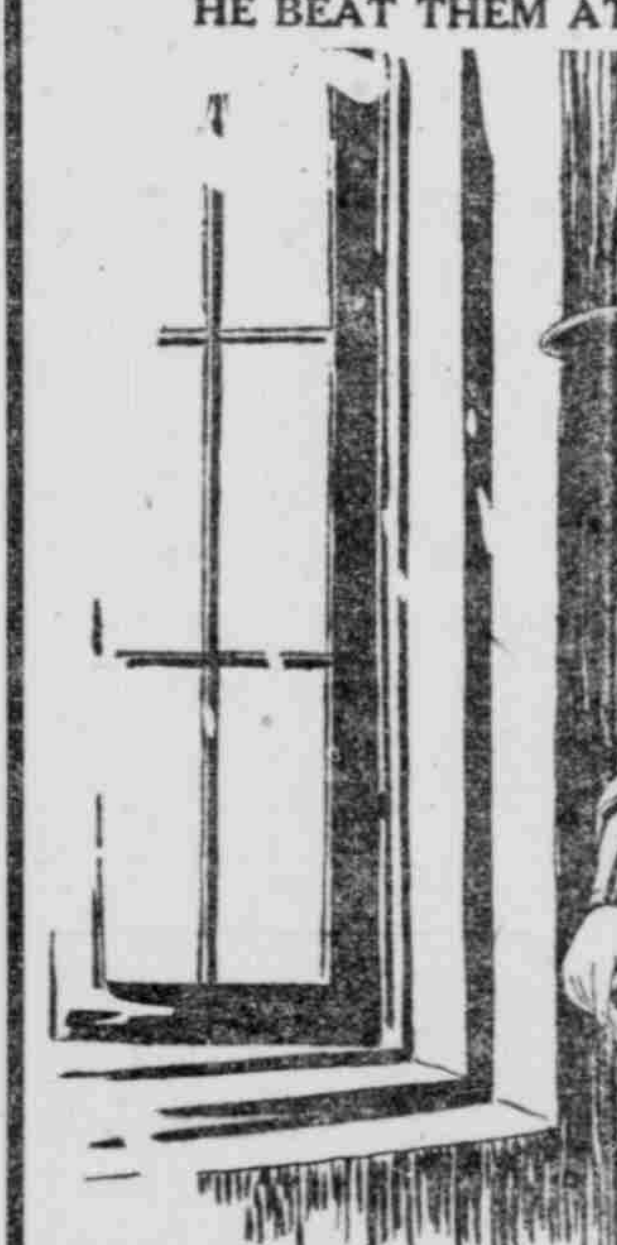

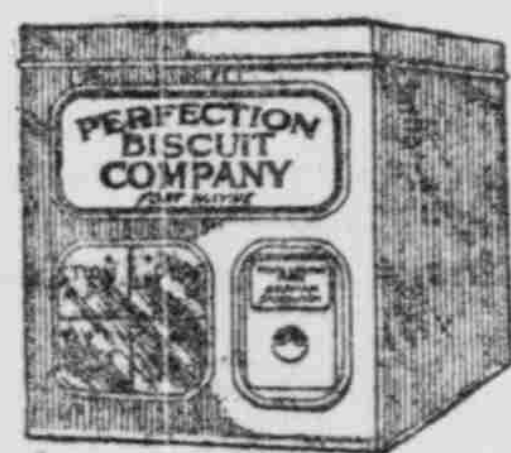
