

One Man Rescued Alive Following Mine Disaster

TRINIDAD, Colo., Aug. 19.—One man has been rescued alive and not more than 20 men, including Fire Boss William Christopher, are believed to be dead in the Oakview mine of the Oakdale Coal Co., near Layeta, which was wrecked by an explosion Monday.

The explosion, said to have been caused by gas, took place about a mile and a half inside the workings. William Davis, a miner, was rescued alive. About 40 men were in the mine when the explosion occurred. Ten came out of the main slope and eight or 10 others came out by way of an old slope.

Rescue work was going forward rapidly Monday night.

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Kitchen Economies

SIX WAYS TO MAKE UNUSUAL FILLINGS FOR CAKES.

The plainest one-egg cake can be made an elaborate company dessert by the addition of some unusual filling. Use either two or more layers, or if some stale sponge cake is on hand try the following:

Scoop out the center of the cake, leaving a wall about one inch thick, into which the filling may be poured. Then mix the crumbs with the filling and place in the hollowed cake.

Apple Filling.

3 baked apples.
1 white egg.
1 cup of powdered sugar.

Press the apples through a sieve. Beat the white of egg until stiff. Add half the quantity of sugar and beat well. Add apple and the remaining half-cupful of sugar gradually, and beat until very light. Spread between layers and on top of cake. Two tablespoonfuls of tart jelly may be beaten with the apple if desired.

Fudge Filling.

1-2 cupfuls of brown sugar.
1 tablespoonful of butter.
1 square of chocolate.
1-3 cupful of milk.
Few grains of salt.

1-2 cupful of chopped nut meats. Place the sugar, butter, chocolate, milk and salt in a saucepan. Heat slowly to boiling point and boil to 240 degrees F., or until a soft ball can be formed when tested in cold water. Remove from the fire, add

the nut meats, and beat until smooth and creamy.

Mocha Filling.

2 tablespoonfuls of hot, black coffee.
1 tablespoonful of butter.
2 tablespoonfuls of cocoa.
1-2 teaspoonful of vanilla.
1 cupful of powdered sugar.
Mix together the coffee, butter, cocoa and vanilla. Add sufficient sugar for mixture to spread without running.

Orange Filling.

1-2 cupful of sugar.
3 tablespoonfuls of flour.
Grated rind of 1-2 orange.
1-2 cupful of orange juice.

1 beaten egg.
1 teaspoonful of butter.
In the top of a double boiler mix the sugar, flour and rind of orange. Add orange juice, egg (beaten) and butter. Cook over hot water for 15 minutes, stirring frequently, until it reaches proper consistency.

Date and Fig Filling.

1 cupful of figs.
1 cupful of dates.
Juice of 1-2 lemon.
1-2 cupful of sugar.
1-2 cupful of boiling water.
Wash, dry and chop the figs. Wash, dry, and chop the dates. Mix the fruit with the sugar, water and lemon juice, and cook over hot water until it gets thick enough to spread.
