
## AT THE OLIVER.

## Pick Laporte Man To Superintend Ditch Building

LAPORTE, Ind., Aug. 19.—Judge Richter Monday announced the appointment of County Surveyor Dunn as commissioner of construction on the Place ditch, which will run through seven northern Indiana counties. The cost of the ditch will total close to \$500,000, and will pass through Laporte, St. Joseph, Marshall and Star counties, besides several counties along the Kankakee river.

Commissioner Dunn will have complete charge of all the work in the construction of the ditch, and will serve as an intermediary between the contractors on the work and the petitioners. The ditch will serve as a drain to tracts of land in the southern part of Laporte county and adjoining counties which are covered each spring by floods and are made useless for tilling purposes.

## KAISER BILL BUYS NEW ESTATE IN DOORN

AMERONGEN, Aug. 19.—It became definitely known today that former Emperor William of Germany has purchased the Doorn estate in the village of Doorn, near Utrecht. The house will be immediately renovated and remodeled. This work will be likely to require several months' time and meantime the former emperor will remain lodged in the Bentinck castle at Amerongen.

Goodrich had been asked by the federal government through Secy. Labor Wilson to send troops to Hammond to protect the property of the United States housing bureau.
