QUIMET TO PLAY IN GOLF TOURNEY

Succeeds in Qualifying for Championship After Four Year Wait.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 19.—Francis Quimet, of Woodland, risked his health Monday to struggle through the 36-hole qualifying round of the National Amateur Golf championship at the Oakmont Country club in order that he would not lose the opportunity he has awaited for more than four years—another chance to win the amateur championship.

Quimet was barred from amateur golf in 1916 by the officials of the United States Golf association, who ruled that he was a professional because he had entered into the sporting goods business. Later, when he went into service, he was reinstated and this tournament is the first opportunity he has had to regain the title he once held.

The Boston golfer was forced to play in the rain most of the way. A number of times he swayed after hitting his shots and he was so weak on the final nine holes of the afternoon play that he topped his tee shots at the 12th, 14th and 18th. But he finished the day with a medal score of 166 in a tie for 14th place with the 12 who will continue tomorrow in the match play rounds.

Champs May Meet Wednesday. There was a triple for the best medal at 128 between James S. Manion, the public links golfer from St. Louis, Davidson Horton, of Oakland, and Paul Tewkesbury, of Ardenminck. Robert T. Jones, Jr., of Atlanta, was in fourth place with 129. It required a score of 172 to qualify, eight players taking part in the play off for two places at that figure.

Of the eight players who got into the play off, D. W. Armstrong, of Oakland, and J. N. Sterns, Jr., of Nassau, won the two remaining places in the match play rounds.

The pairings for the first round of the match are such that if Evans Leats Armstrong, and Quimet leads Stearns in the first round, the two stars will meet in the second round Wednesday.

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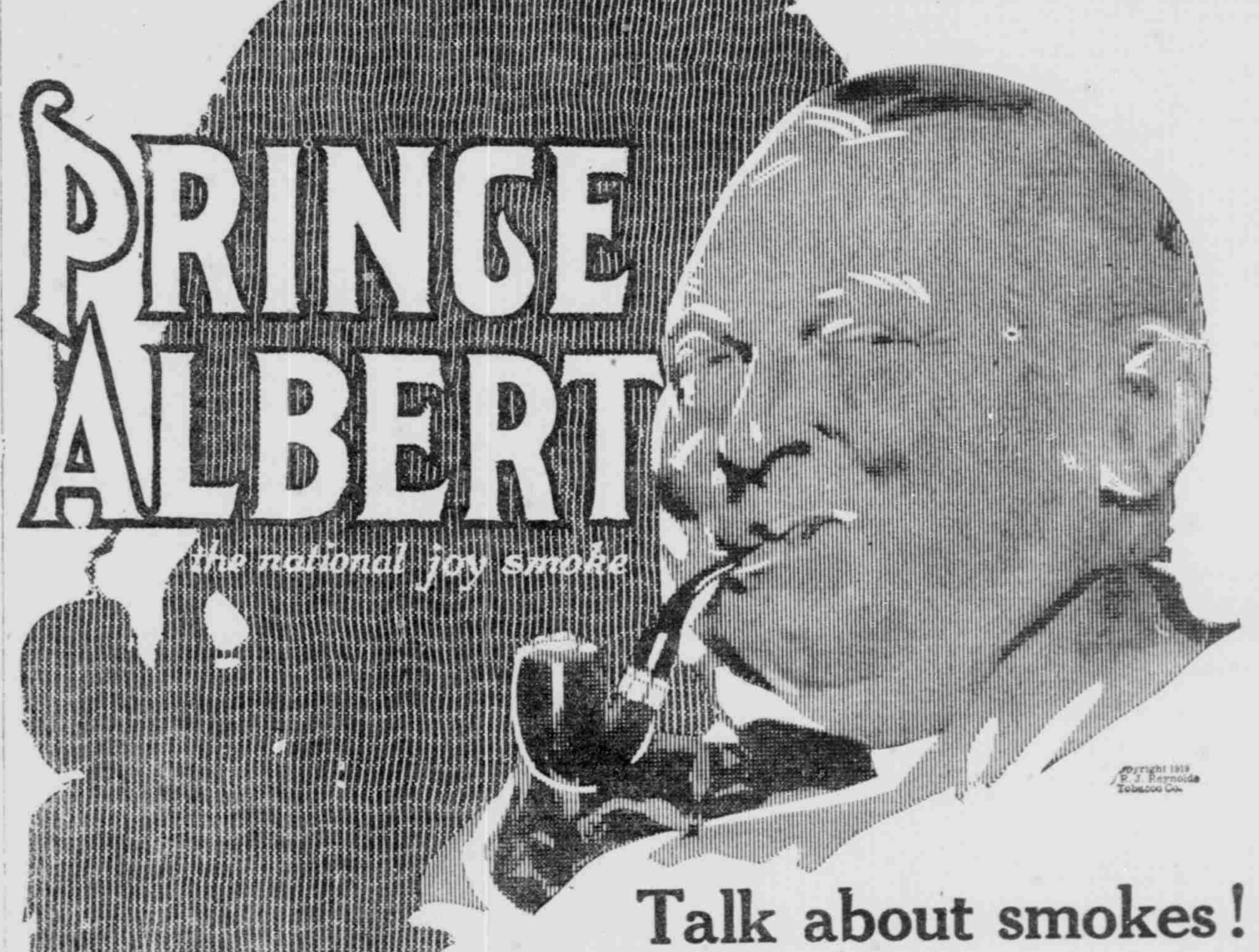
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
