They told him that they would let him do the distributing provided he could assure them that he would do the job properly.

Mikulich immediately went to his home and returned with \$700, which he gave to the men. They in turn gave him the suit case. When Mikulich opened it he found that it was stuffed with paper, but the men were gone.
