HUNGARIANS HAVE FISTIC ENCOUNTER

Mix-up in North Side Flats Leads to Arrests of Two People.

Alke Sharvak, 809 E. Battell st., this city and Julius Hadron, 601 E. Scott st., South Bend, were arrested by the local police last night. The arrests are the results of trouble which occurred in the Hungarian flats on the north side. Sharvak is charged with intoxication and Hadron with assault and battery.

The men got into a quarrel over a trip to South Bend in Hadron's machine for which the latter had charged Sharvak \$2.00. In the heated argument which followed Hadron is alleged to have struck Sharvak across the face causing severe injuries to the latter's nose and eyes. Sharvak became angry and started after Hadron. He saw his car on the street and attempted to destroy it. In the process he ran his hands through the window shield sustaining severe cuts.

Both men will be arraigned before Judge Feig in the city court Friday morning.

CLEVELAND HOLDS SHIPS OF WORLD

Anchors Manufactured There Are on Vessels of the Seven Seas.

here under the name of the "St. Louis Association of Journalists." Employees of the five English language newspapers published here and representatives of press associations are eligible to membership in the association.

The association has taken a definite stand against affiliation with trades unions. In seeking wage adjustments, the association voted to require employees of each newspaper to bargain collectively with their respective employers.

A majority of the editorial workers employed here have joined the association and plans are being made to affiliate with other similar organizations throughout the country with the view of forming a national association of newspaper men.

Eight carloads of steel anchors, the largest single consignment on record, recently was shipped from Cleveland to the Emergency Fleet corporation at Hog Island. They will be placed on the decks of modern trading ships which America is sending after the trade of the world.

They are modern "national stockless" anchors of the latest approved design. The old-fashioned "T" bar at the top has been eliminated but the rabbit-eared flukes are turned and built to hold to the ocean floor whenever cast.

Before the war, Cleveland anchors were famous in Great Lakes. But it was only when ships went down to sea the anchors made inland became world famous. Now they are carried not only under the American flag but under the banners of almost every nation.
