

SWITCHED PLATES CAUSED ARREST

Local Man Operates Studebaker Car With Chevrolet License Number.

Harry Durst, proprietor of a pool room and cigar store at Washington and Walnut sts., was arrested for the second time by the Laporte police Friday night for driving Studebaker car with a Chevrolet license plate. The Laporte authorities gave it as their opinion that Durst was a bootlegger operating here, and that this fact explains his many trips through Laporte on his way to Chicago to get liquor.

Durst was arrested at Laporte some time ago for driving through Lincoln way at daredevil speed when the street was closed during a band concert. This, together with the fact that he makes so many trips through the city, made the Laporte police suspicious of Durst, causing a patrolman to take particular notice of him when he saw him driving through Friday in his Studebaker car.

Car Badly Smashed.
The car had been badly smashed up in a wreck in South Bend some weeks ago, and since the auto did not look quite the same as it did when Durst was arrested and gave the appearance of being a stolen car, the officer reported Durst as having been in town. He had left the car at the Rose garage.

Chief Norris immediately phoned Indianapolis to find who the car belonged to through identification by the license plate. It was found that the license plate belonged to a Chevrolet owned by a man in South Bend.

After leaving his car at the garage, Durst and a companion went to Chicago on a New York Central train. When they returned they were met by police officers and escorted to the station where on arraignment in city court they were fined \$10, with \$10 costs, for driving a car with a license belonging to another person. Durst paid his fine and left Laporte.
