

TEACH LESS, BUT BETTER, ADVICE

Dr. Moriarty and Prof. Pittman Make Address to Educators Here.

Urging that the public schools should teach less that they might teach better, Dr. W. D. Moriarty addressed the general session of the teachers' institute Tuesday morning, having as his subject, "The Psychology of Re-enforcement."

Dr. Moriarty believes that the curricula of the public schools is so crowded that those subjects of bidding value are given insufficient attention. He claims that the subjects which are to be made a permanent possession of the child must be taught and re-taught if their fundamentals are to be grasped and retained.

"Hobby horses have come into disrepute because of skillless, spectacular riders with their eyes on the grandstand instead of the goal," Prof. M. S. Pittman told the teachers at the afternoon session in delivering his talk on "Have You a Hobby Horse?"

Cites Many Examples. All great achievements have riding at the head of the procession, a captain astride a hobby horse, he asserted and then cited numerous examples in art, music, science, literature, business and in fact from every line of endeavor to prove his assertion. In answer to the question, "What makes a good hobby horse?" he said it was one upon which we can fasten pulling gears and one which can carry the whole family of school problems. Being on time for every duty, teaching the child and not the subject, being able to discover in any child the possibilities of a king or queen were some of the hobbies which he urged.

"The world made Charlie Chaplin rich because he possessed an inimitable wiggle which delighted and amused the world," he said in conclusion, "and the task for each and every one of us is to discover our wiggle that the world wants."

The Wednesday morning session will be given over to Dr. Colgrove who will speak on "Opening the Windows of the Mind" and in the afternoon Prof. Pittman will talk on "Attitude, the Chief Requisite."

COURT IS QUIET, FOR ONCE; ONLY FOUR CASES

Julia Uhl, who is held under bond charged with provocation, will be given a hearing before Judge Gilmer in police court Sept. 3. She was to have been tried Tuesday morning but on account of the fact that her attorney, J. J. Kovacs, is serving on the bench in the absence of Judge Gilmer, her trial had to be set for a later date.

MRS. CARLISLE ON COMMITTEE

Chosen Member of Roosevelt Memorial Association—Will Hold Campaign.

Mrs. Anne Studebaker Carlisle has been appointed as one of the two women members of the state executive committee of the national Roosevelt memorial association, the other woman member being Mrs. Alice Foster McCullough, state chairman of the woman's work in the Liberty loan campaigns. The personnel of the committee as named Monday by Pres't William Boyce Thompson of New York, includes the names of many of Indiana's most prominent citizens.

Mrs. Carlisle has been unable to formulate as yet any definite plans for conducting the local campaign for South Bend's share of the \$150,000 which has been tentatively set as Indiana's quota of the \$5,000,000, the minimum amount to be subscribed for at the meeting of the executive committee to be held on Sept. 11 at Indianapolis, a plan to be used universally throughout the cities of the state will be evolved undoubtedly.

To Talk "Americanization." The campaign for funds is to be conducted during the week of Oct. 29-31 and Mrs. Carlisle has been advised by William C. Hobbs, state chairman, that "Americanization" is to be made the keynote of the appeal. The American people are to be urged to acquire Rooseveltian ideals, to practice the "square deal," and to be loyal to America, which will follow the better citizenship, better government and more prosperous industry.

Specifically the \$5,000,000 which is to be raised is to be used as follows: to erect a national memorial at Washington; to establish a park at Oyster Bay, Long Island, which may ultimately include Sagamore Hill, Col. Roosevelt's home; and to establish a foundation devoted to perpetuating Roosevelt's ideals of Americanism.

VENEREAL CLINIC READY NEXT WEEK

Indianapolis Specialist to Take Charge of Treatments Starting Next Week.

South Bend's free venereal clinic will be in operation by next Monday or Tuesday, under the direction of Dr. F. W. Bush, a venereal expert and specialist of Indianapolis, who is to arrive in South Bend Wednesday to take charge of the work here. It was announced by Dr. E. G. Freyermuth, secretary of the local health board, Tuesday morning.

The clinic will be located at 313 S. Lafayette Blvd., where workmen are now engaged in remodeling necessary to install hospital equipment. Dr. Bush, who will be in full charge, has degrees from a number of the leading medical schools of the United States, and Dr. Freyermuth says he is thoroughly competent to handle the situation in this city.

Mark's End of Fight. The opening of the clinic here will mark the end of a long fight waged between Dr. Freyermuth and his supporters against many different opponents. Some months ago leases were signed to provide location for the clinic in the Farmers Trust Bldg., but concerted action by other tenants of the building stopped installation of the equipment there. Other locations were sought, but never successfully.

The fight on venereal disease is being conducted throughout the United States mainly through the help and under the direction of the United States Public Health service, which furnishes model ordinances, and similar aids, to cities. Legal requirements forcing examination and treatment of all persons found to be infected are expected to aid materially in combating the disease in South Bend.

GOVERNMENT GUARDS CHICAGO WAREHOUSES

By United Press. CHICAGO, Aug. 26.—Government investigators today guarded every freight warehouse in Chicago to prevent reshipment of sugar to other cities by Chicago dealers who had hoarded supplies here.

The owner of one car of sugar seized yesterday has failed today to claim the consignment. District Atty. Clyde said he believed the owner preferred to sacrifice the sugar rather than have his identity become known.

Clyde promised "instant arrest" will follow attempts to sell sugar in cars now on sidings in the city.

SAYS ALLEGED FAKING OF CATTLE RECORDS IS UNTRUE

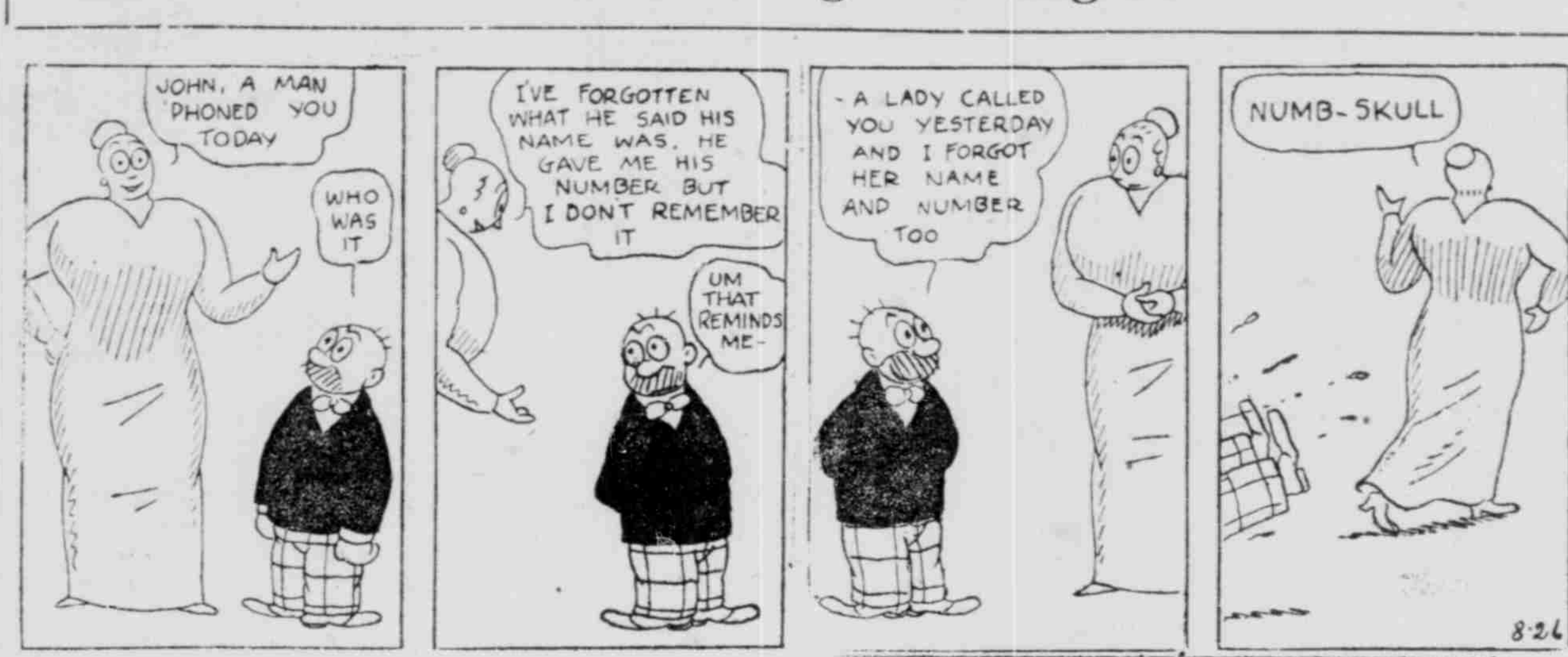
BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 26.—The alleged faking of New York state dairy cattle records was a story made out of whole cloth, according to an affidavit and retraction read before a committee including Pres't. Aiken of Flint, Mich., of the Holstein-Friesian association at a closed meeting here Monday.

The affidavit was signed by Charles Cole, whose confession of having helped the showing of Oliver Cabana's prize cattle by injecting cream into the milk pails while official tests were on, threw the Holstein industry of the country into a furore.

Cole stated in the affidavit that he received \$10,000 for making the "confession," which Cabana's lawyers claim was afterward used in an attempt to frighten Mr. Cabana.

Prof. W. H. H. Wing of the State College of Agriculture in charge of all dairy tests in the state, said he believed the Cabana records were bona fide.

According to Mr. Borden very few changes are to be made in the school system for he intends to pursue quite closely this year the policy of late Supt. Nuner. The task of appointing teachers is nearing completion and Mr. Borden hopes to announce all assignments on Friday or Saturday of this week.

At a meeting of all principals and supervisors held at the high school Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock definite arrangements were made for the opening of school next Tuesday.

TO REGULATE FOOD HANDLERS AT FAIR

Local Health Board Issues Instruction for Sanitation During Event.

Dr. E. G. Freyermuth, secretary of the local board of health, has issued advance orders to be maintained at the Inter-State fair for the safeguarding of public health. The rules used will be those adopted at a meeting of the state board of health last July 9.

The lunch stands, refreshments stands, etc., and similar concessions will be governed by the following rules:

An adequate supply of pure drinking water shall be provided through sanitary fountains before the fall is opened. A sample of the water to be supplied shall be sent to the water laboratory of the state board of health for analysis, and the purity is so established.

An adequate supply of covered garbage cans shall be provided. The garbage cans shall be emptied at least once a day at some point sufficiently distant to avoid noisome odors, spreading diseases or attracting flies to the vicinity of the food handling stands.

All toilets and urinals shall be cleaned, disinfected, and screened before the fair opens, and then shall be kept clean and sanitary throughout the term of the fair.

Must Use Hot Water. All glasses, dishes, knives, forks and spoons shall be thoroughly sterilized after each use by being washed in hot water containing an adequate amount of alkaline cleansing powder and then by rinsing in clean water. If paper cups are used they shall be destroyed when once used.

All foodstuffs shall be completely protected from flies, dust and all other contamination.

Griddles for frying sausages, hamburgers, etc., shall be covered. Meats shall be kept in good condition by the use of ice.

Candies, crackerjack, etc., shall not be made on the grounds except inside of buildings and then only in rooms set apart for that purpose, or under conditions that have been approved by the state board of health.

Carriers in which ice cream cones and lemonade are distributed shall be covered.

Food handlers shall be provided with health certificates issued by a competent physician.
