

## TWO INJURED BY UNKNOWN AUTOIST

Does Not Stop After Accident.  
Breaks Leg of 10 Year  
Old Girl.

Muriel Hewson, 10 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph F. Hewson, received a broken leg and internal injuries. Mrs. G. Hewson received a sprained ankle and other minor bruises Thursday morning when they were struck by an automobile belonging to an unidentified party. The accident happened on Lincoln way W. about four miles west of this city.

Mr. Hewson had just pulled his machine up along the right side of the road to make some repairs, and his wife, his brother and the little girl were standing in the rear of the machine. A minute later the little girl had started to run across the road when Mr. Hewson, seeing a machine approaching, made an attempt to rescue her but it was too late and they were both struck.

### Machine Hits Daughter.

According to Ralph Hewson, the machine that hit his daughter and brother, did not stop until it had gone nearly a quarter of a mile down the road and when it did stop the occupants only looked back long enough to see the injured persons being carried to Mr. Hewson's machine.

Through the kindness of another automobile party that passed along a few moments later the injured people were taken to the Epworth hospital. Mr. Hewson said last night that although the accident probably could not have been avoided by the driver of the unknown car he could see no reason why they did not re-

turn and offer their services or at least find out if they had seriously injured anybody.

### FORCED TO RESIGN

Archduke Joseph, who recently regained power for a Hapsburg in Hungary at the time the Rumanian troops occupied Budapest, has resigned as head of the Hungarian government, according to a dispatch from Paris. Herbert Hoover, head of the international relief organization, who returned to Paris recently after a trip through central Europe, advised that immediate action be taken to depose the archduke and give Hungary an opportunity to form a popular government. Archduke Joseph's ascent to control followed the brief administration of Premier Julius Peidl, who formed a socialist cabinet after Bela Kuhn had been overthrown.

### RABBIT EXHIBIT TO BE AT FAIR

Fanciers Decide to Show at  
Inter-State Fair Instead  
of Poultry Show.

More than 300 rabbits and cavy will be on exhibit this year at the Inter-State fair, which is to be held at Springbrook farm from Sept. 9 to 13, inclusive. This was decided at a meeting of the South Bend and Mishawaka association of fanciers held in the Chamber of Commerce rooms. Included in the number to be shown are some unusual heavy-weight stock. These heavy-weight rabbits and cavy that will be on exhibit will weigh between 12 and 16 pounds.

A demonstration of the number of pounds of meat than can be raised annually by one doe rabbit will be given. An exhibit of fur taken from rabbit hides will also be shown. Although there were less than 50 breeders in attendance at last night's meeting, more than 125 breeders of this county have signified their intentions of entering their individual stocks.

#### First Year at Fair.

This is the first year that this association has exhibited at the local fair. Heretofore the annual exhibit has been held in connection with the annual poultry show, which is held during the winter. This year the members of the association were approached by the officials in charge of the Inter-State fair and were induced to enter their stocks at the local fair. It is expected that the breeders will place their stock on exhibit at the fair annually and will do away with the winter show.

P. N. Nevin, secretary of the local association, was in charge of last night's meeting. During the coming week he will meet each member of the association to determine the actual number of breeders that will enter stock and the number each member intends to place on exhibit.
