

## SOUTH SHORE ASKS INCREASED FARES

Railway Company Petitions State Body for Additional Revenue Measure.

Increases in one-way passenger ticket fares, train fares, and commutation ticket fares are asked by the Chicago, Lake Shore and South Bend railway company in a petition filed with the public service commission of Indiana. The petition asks that the company be empowered to put the proposed changes in effect on one day's notice.

The advance in the one-way ticket fare, if granted, will make the minimum rate basis three cents a mile with a minimum fare of ten cents for any one trip. The present rate is 2 1/2 cents a mile, the schedule carrying that figure being adopted April 11, 1919.

**Want Train Fares Higher.**

Train fares will be ten cents higher than ticket fares, according to the petition. This excess fare will be charged only from the station stops at South Bend, New Carlisle, Hammond, East Chicago, Gary, Miller and Michigan City.

Commutation ticket rates between several northern Indiana cities will be cancelled entirely, if the company's wishes are granted by the public service commission. Permission for cancellation is asked of some of the commutation rate between South Bend and Lake Park, Hammond and Cudahy, Gary and Farnessville, Gary and Baileytown, Gary and Hammond, and Gary and East Chicago. Increases in some other commutation fares are also asked, the changes affecting Gary, Hammond and East Chicago.

The petition states that the passenger revenue derived from the sale of one-way tickets and the collection of train fares on the basis of 2 1/2 cents per mile is not sufficient to pay operating expenses and fixed charges.

John is an iceman. While driving around the city peddling the precious commodity, he figured out a little scheme to make some money on the side. The only trouble was that one thrifty housewife thought she wasn't exactly getting her money's worth, and made a complaint which caused Officers Tholander and Baxter to pick Shanafelt up.

The way John worked it, according to the testimony of the woman who made the complaint, was by pulling extra tickets out of the ice-book, selling the amount of ice represented by the extra tickets, and keeping the money, afterwards turning in the tickets to cover the theft.

The particular instance which she pointed out to Deputy Prosecutor Schock was one book which Shanafelt sold her, from which he removed a 25 pound ticket from the front of the book for 25 pounds of ice delivered, and also removed tickets for 100 pounds from the back of the book.

## 'NO EXCITEMENT,' SAYS DOC. SMITH

Josephson Reappears in Favorite Recitation, "I Have Nothing to Give Out."

"Nothing exciting," was accomplished by the board of safety at their meeting, Friday night, the quoted phrase being that of Dr. Louis J. Smith, president of the board. Harry Josephson, clerk of the board, gave out his usual statement, "I have nothing to give out."

Dr. Smith and Nelson Kyser were the only two members of the board present at the meeting, so the much needed reorganization of the police department, beginning with the "ranking heads," could not be considered. Action on this matter was deferred until some time in the future, when the vacations of the board members are over.

**May Get New Excuse.**  
If it happens that a full membership is ever present at a meeting, it is believed that some other excuse can be found for not making the necessary shake-up. The board has allowed the detective department to be without a head since August 8, so a few more weeks won't make any difference in the opinion of the board.

In the same room where the board met, the dust continued to gather on the Bertillon system files, the finger print bureau, and the other modern systems which have gone into disuse since Chief Kline came into office. The resignation of William Barnhart as sergeant of detectives nearly a month ago left the department without a man who can read and classify finger prints, and no action was taken by the board Friday night to select some one to learn this work.

Fire Chief Sibrel and Thomas Beanning, superintendent of the alarm system, made their regular weekly reports to the board, and other routine business was transacted.

The general delivery window will be open for three hours, from 7 until 10 a. m., for the accommodation of general delivery patrons only.

## Tourists Sleep in Open; Local Hotels Crowded

Tourists will soon begin to avoid over-night stays in South Bend unless more accommodations are made for housing transients here. In the opinion of one local hotel manager, it is an uncommon thing now for persons arriving in the city late at night to secure rooms at any of the better hotels, unless they have reservations made in advance.

One party of automobile tourists, consisting of two women and four children, were forced to spend Thursday night in their machine, as they were unable to secure accommodations of any kind. They made the rounds of the hotels, and even drove to Mishawaka in search of rooms, but were unsuccessful.

Some of the smaller hotels are taking advantage of this condition to charge rates which formerly applied only to the large hostleries, the traveling public being forced to pay the bill or sleep in railroad stations or other public places.

The situation has been particularly acute the past week. One policeman on a down town beat kept track of the number of inquiries he had Thursday night, and in the morning he had a total of 22 to report. Practically every one of these persons had visited several hotels, only to be told that all of the rooms were filled for the night.

## United States Recognizes Peruvian Government

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Recognition of the de facto government of Peru was announced Friday by the state department. Sec'y Lansing instructed the American legation at Lima to advise the minister of foreign affairs that the United States recognizes Pres't Leguia as head of the de facto government of Peru.

The attitude of the United States toward the new Peruvian government had been awaited with interest because of the manner in which it came into power. In the case of the former Tinoco regime in Costa Rica, the administration policy was set forth that the United States would recognize no government founded on force. Although Pres't Leguia seized the Peruvian government through virtually a bloodless revolution July 4, in elections held last Sunday and Monday his party was placed in complete control.

The result of the elections, which passed quietly, it was said by some officials, probably were instrumental in obtaining recognition for him.


