

## GIVE NEW STATE PRINT CONTRACT

Lansing Firm Gets Contract  
in Michigan Over In-  
diana Concern.

LANSING, Mich., March 31.—The new state printing contract has been awarded to Wyncoff, Hallenbeck and Crawford, Lansing, on a bid of \$233,539 lower than that submitted by the Port Wayne (Ind.) Printing Co., present holders of the contract, it was announced here today.

The new contract was let after being advertised for bids for the second time. The first time it was advertised all bids were rejected as too high. Fully \$90,000 will be saved to taxpayers under the new contract in the two-year period covered, experts estimate.

**Award Contracts.**  
Bludeau, Siebert and Gates, Lansing, were awarded the binding contract on a bid \$10,000 lower than the nearest competitor, Port Wayne Printing Co.'s bid on binding was lower than the successful firm's but the board of state auditors ruled out the Indiana concern on the ground that it was impractical to have printing done at Lansing and binding in another state.

State printing contracts have been a subject of controversy ever since the two-year contract was let to the Indiana firm two years ago. The Port Wayne company's representative charged when bids were rejected in the winter that it was a step engineered through political influence to turn the low bid in order to beat it by a small margin.
