

ROTARIANS GUESTS OF KIWANIS CLUB AT THURSDAY MEET

International Secretary of
Kiwanis Clubs Will Ad-
dress Gathering.

More than 300 business men of the city are expected to attend the luncheon at the Oliver hotel next Thursday noon at the joint meeting of the South Bend Kiwanis and Rotary clubs. The Kiwanis club is entertaining the Rotary club on this occasion. The luncheon will be addressed by G. Samuel Cummings of Chicago, international secretary of the Kiwanis clubs. Mr. Cummings will tell of the workings and ideals of the Kiwanis movement, which has grown in five years to an international body of 25,000 business men in 300 cities of the United States and Canada.

The chairman of the meeting will be Fred C. Reimold, a former president of the Kiwanis club. Mr. Reimold has been asked to act in place of Charles E. Speth, president of the club, who will be out of the city. Russell E. Ward, of Jackson, Mich., and L. M. H. Schmid, president of the city, now international trustees of Kiwanis, will also be present at the meeting. Special music has been arranged for the occasion, and other features are also planned. The meeting will last an hour and a half, the usual time allotted to noonday Kiwanis gathering.

Whenever possible, the Kiwanis members have been instructed to bring to the luncheon their competitors, who are members of the Rotary clubs.

STEEL WORKERS IDLE DUE TO RAIL TIE-UP

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 10.—Thousands of additional men were put out of work yesterday as a result of a strike of "insurgent" switchmen. Nearly all the furnaces at the Lackawanna Steel company's plant here were banked last night, throwing 5,000 to 6,000 men out of work. The Donner Steel plant officials announced that every furnace but the blast furnaces will be shut down and no man's coal is obtainable during the day.

Officials of many other industries said their plants will begin laying off men Monday if the strike continues. All livestock was being shipped to the stockyards here by truck, an official said.

Following the successful concert at the high school the club members, who were in charge of the big "M", met at Kables for supper before leaving on their special for Niles. The emblem was left unguarded by the fatigued for a few minutes and then it was discovered to be missing. No trace of the culprits could be found, none of the hundreds of passers by had seen them. Hardly deid, according to the Michigan club, rushed to the police station for aid in the matter but the police did not deem the loss sufficient for personal investigation at the time. 
