**IN OLD KENTUCKY.** Anita Stewart makes a startling leap on horseback over a broken bridge above a chasm, in a scene "In Old Kentucky" in which she appeared at the Auditorium yesterday. The bridge is a draw over a deep ravine, but it has been wrecked. In the story it is necessary for Miss Stewart to leap over this chasm in order to reach a man who is lying unconscious in the road far beneath her, where the man has placed a massive bomb beneath him. The horse on which she is mounted at first refuses to make the jump, but she starts again and spurred it to the utmost speed, rides straight for the broken bridge. Half an hour after Mrs. Derby went to the bath room to wash clothing she was found dead by her husband, who is a sheet metal worker at the Crow auto plant in Elkhart. They were making preparations to attend a social event.

Mrs. Derby, whose maiden name was Nellie Leer, was born in New Paris. She was married to Mr. Derby February 23, 1918. Her husband was overseas with the United States troops.

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## Preserves Youth and Beauty

WAWASEE LAKE MAY  
BE WITHOUT HOTEL  
IN SUMMER SEASON

GOSHEN, Ind., April 12.—Wawasee Inn at Lake Wawasee, destroyed by fire last fall, is not likely to be replaced this season. Indianapolis parties who had plans drafted for a large hotel to be built on the site of the long familiar inn, have allowed the option on the ground to expire and it is said the project may be abandoned, as it is difficult of high prices for all kinds of building material and unreasonable demands made by organized labor in this section.

For more than a week carpenters have been in strike, demanding 85 cents an hour, 50 hour week, time and one-half for overtime, double time for holidays and a week's vacation. Contractors and union carpenters are as far apart as ever with no likelihood of an understanding being reached. Contractors say they will abandon any work on every project now under way in this city before they will yield to union demands. Under these circumstances Lake Wawasee is doomed to be without adequate hotel accommodations.
