FINE MUSICAL TREAT AT LOCAL CHURCH

Chicago Organist Enthusies
Large Audiences. Soloists
of Merit on Program.

The organ recital at the First Methodist Episcopal church last night was in every respect one of the finest musical treats ever afforded a Mishawaka audience. The performance of J. Lewis Brown, organist of St. Patrick's cathedral, Chicago, was highly meritorious and elicited hearty applause. In all of his selection he displayed wonderful technique, while his keen appreciation of the composers works was evident in every number, should he again return to Mishawaka he will be doubly welcome. The assisting artists were: Miss Hazel Harris, soprano who excelled in her respective numbers; Frederick Ingersoll, violinist, who maintained his high excellence; Hans Roeder, cellist, an artist of much ability; and Madge Woodward Romine, pianist, whose work merited high encomiums.
