

MAY BUY UP 11 BABY RAILROADS

Chicago and Northwestern
Proposes Consolidation of
Small Lines.

CHICAGO, April 13.—Eleven baby railroads may be bought outright if officials of the Chicago and Northwestern railroad can prevail on stockholders meeting here today to take up the matter.

The railroads which are serving as branches of the Northwestern are scattered throughout the middle west and are bought by the Northwestern to be included in its assets.

Wolf River Valley Railway Co., Belle Fourche Valley Railway Co., James River Valley and North Western Railway Co., Macoupin County Extension Railway Co., Iowa Southern Railway Co., Missouri Valley and Blair Railway and Bridge Co., Wyoming and Northwestern Railway Co., Pierre, Rapid City and Northwestern Railway Co., Pierre and Fort Pierre Bridge Railway Co., and The Fox, Ladd and Eastern Railroad Co., and The Albany Railroad Bridge Co.

At the offices of the Northwestern here today it was stated that the object of taking over the roads is for bookkeeping purposes.

"All these roads are controlled by the Northwestern but the company is preparing to negotiate a loan and wants to include these roads in its available assets." It was stated.

FREEZE FAILS TO DAMAGE FRUIT

Local Horticultural Man Issues Statement Regarding Conditions.

The Easter freeze which hit Indiana along with the rest of the middle west and the snow and ice which accompanied the cold wave, caused little or no damage to the fruit crop according to a statement by H. H. Swain, secretary of the Indiana Horticultural society.

Mr. Swain issued the statement after receipt of mail reports from fruit growers in all parts of Indiana.

"Having been retarded by previous cold weather the fruit was not damaged by the heavy frost on the nights of April 24 and 25. This shows, it was pointed out, that the 1920 crop is not yet past the danger point."

TRUCK DEALERS TO HAVE JACKIE BAND

Commander Culp of Great Lakes Naval Station Promises Aid.

A Jackie band from the Great Lakes naval training station will accompany the South Bend truck dealers on their tour through northern Indiana and southern Michigan to demonstrate the value of the truck on the farm, according to an announcement made Tuesday by H. C. Ridgway, the organizer of the trip. Word was received yesterday from Commander Culp of the naval station that a band of 21 pieces would be here to go on the tour.

It is probable that the date for the start of the tour will be changed from Monday, April 28 to Thursday, April 29 at a meeting of the truck dealers to be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Chamber of Commerce. The original plans for the tour would have brought the trucks back to South Bend on Wednesday to spend the night there, leaving the following morning for North Liberty. Under the new arrangements the trucks will return to South Bend on Saturday night, staying here over Sunday, and leaving on Monday morning for North Liberty.

As a result of this change it is probable that the Jackie band will give a concert in South Bend on Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon. This matter will be taken up with the Chamber of Commerce and the retail merchants' bureau of the Chamber of Commerce.
