Persons who have never before resorted to pawning cherished belongings to obtain enough money to help them live, are now steady patrons of the loan brokers.

"Our business has been greater than ever before," said Paul Korshak, loan broker, "I have noted a steady increase in amounts we lend as well as a change in the class of persons to whom we advance money. The middle class clerks, teachers and department sales girls—patronize us to a great extent now. The laborer is making plenty of money and we don't see him often."
