

STOWAWAYS MARRY AMERICAN SOLDIERS

Two Russian Refugees Escape
Deportation by Entering
Matrimonial Alliances.

MANILA, P. I., April 15.—Two Russian girls who arrived recently from Siberia as stowaways on the transport Crook, escaped deportation today by marrying American soldiers of the 31st infantry.

The girls, Olga Vohromayeva and Feodraha Motha, dressed as American soldiers, boarded the transport at Vladivostok, and their identity did not become known until the ship, carrying more than 1,000 officers and men of the 31st infantry, was well on her voyage. When they attempted to land here they were taken into custody.

An hour before the transport Madawaska was ready to sail for Vladivostok, the girls were taken to the pier by officers of the immigration service who expected to start them on their return to Siberia.

While the party was waiting at the pier and a Filipino policeman

was guarding the girls, Sergt. Morris Duncan and Pvt. P. Neil of the 31st infantry appeared with marriage licenses and a Filipino minister who performed a double ceremony.

When told to get ready to embark, the girls protested.

A crowd which had been attracted to the pier, cheered the girls as they refused to budge.

While the officer at the pier attempted to seek advice over the telephone from headquarters, the Madawaska pulled into the stream and started on her way to Vladivostok.

The immigration authorities decided to release the girls from custody, and as they drove away with their husbands, the crowd gave them a farewell cheer.
