WISCONSIN CLUB TO OPPOSE THEM

Coach Dorais Will Send George Murphy to Mound. Good Lineup.

The sweetest music to the trained ear of the fan, the sharp, crackling sound of the bat coming into contact with the horseshoe sphere will be audible at Notre Dame today. The season will be officially opened at 4 o'clock this afternoon when Coach Gus Dorais pits his Notre Dame nine against Wisconsin university's baseball representatives. A goodly number of South Bend fans are expected to be in the stands. The price of admission for visitors will be 50 cents.

This is the red letter day that many of the faithful have been awaiting for months. After devouring spring training ballgame for the past six weeks, Gold and Blue fans are anxious to see for themselves the strength of their 1930 diamond legions.

Murphy Will Pitch.
George Murphy will be on the mound for Notre Dame today. Coach Dorais passed out this interesting bit of information last night. Notre Dame fans, at least that part which has been watching the daily progress of the big hurler, is banking on him to win. Murphy took a short workout Thursday afternoon and he appeared to have all the silver-toned form that has made Notre Dame pitchers famous. He gave the ball all the gas it could hold and let it go with an easy, effortless motion that bespoke a mellow physique.

Dorais has not decided upon the hurler for the Saturday contest with the Badgers. Lahey, Foley and Steiny are in good condition. It is not unlikely that Mohart will be given a chance to pitch against the Big Ten title seekers. Mohart has shown the ear marks of mid-season form the past week and if he can locate the plate with a tolerable degree of accuracy, he should be good for a nine inning struggle tomorrow.

In the outfield there will be Mohard in center and Connors in right. Coach Dorais has not decided upon the outfielders for the Saturday contest. Three monogram men, Scofield, Morgan and Donovan, are available for left field.

OLYMPIC TRYOUTS TO BE HELD IN HARVARD STADIUM NEXT JULY

NEW YORK, April 12.—The events to be contested at all American Olympic tryout meetings this summer will be the regular amateur athletic union standard track and field competitions in place of the Olympic metric events that will prevail at Antwerp. This decision, announced Thursday, is necessitated by the fact that the final trial for the American team, which will sail for Belgium on July 24, will be held in conjunction with the amateur athletic union championships.

According to the present schedule the A. A. U. titular games will be scheduled in the Harvard stadium at Boston on Saturday, July 17, and will be preceded by sectional Olympic tryouts at Philadelphia and Chicago on June 26 and Pasadena, July 2. The final trials for places on the Olympic team will be held in the week beginning July 11, and will be conducted under the Olympic standards and regulations.
