18 YEAR OLD GIRL ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

Miss Kasimer Nobolinski
Swallows Iodine When
Jilted by Her Lover.

Miss Kasimer Nobolinski, 18 years old, is in a serious condition at the home of her sister, Mrs. Grace N. Jones, Lincoln way W., as the result of attempting to commit suicide.

She returned home from work yesterday shortly after noon in a despondent mood and refused to talk to her sister. She later went to the home of Mrs. Anna Johnson, iodine. Her moans attracted her sister's attention and Mrs. Jones wrapped at the door. Receiving no answer she entered the room and found Miss Nobolinski lying on the floor. She immediately summoned medical aid and the girl was revived. Miss Nobolinski wrote to her mother, saying that her sweetheart had told her he did not want to see her again. He was going to marry another girl.

She returned home from work yesterday shortly after noon in a despondent mood and refused to talk to her sister. She later went to the home of Mrs. Anna Johnson, iodine. Her moans attracted her sister's attention and Mrs. Jones wrapped at the door. Receiving no answer she entered the room and found Miss Nobolinski lying on the floor. She immediately summoned medical aid and the girl was revived. Miss Nobolinski wrote to her mother, saying that her sweetheart had told her he did not want to see her again. He was going to marry another girl.
