ARRESTED AS RESULT OF STEALING MILK; RELEASED ON BONDS

What three young people thought to be a joke turned out to be serious and resulted in the arrest of Thelma Nikart, 16 years old, 302 Lincoln way W., Mishawaka; Charles Short and Harris Davis, 18 years old, South Bend, Saturday. They were arrested at 2 o'clock in the morning while stealing milk bottles from the porches of homes in the 400 block, Lincoln way W. Before City Judge Feig, the boys entered pleas of guilty to petit larceny. They were given a severe lecture by the judge, who impressed them with the seriousness of the crime. He took the case under advisement and released them on a \$50 bond each for their appearance in court next Saturday, when sentence will be pronounced.

The youthful trio was riding in a Studebaker touring car on Lincoln way and stopped at the porches gathering up the filled milk bottles which had been left by the Mishawaka Dairy company. They had three quarts and five pints when arrested. The affidavit filed against them charged them with stealing one pint of milk from the home of Carl Burkett.

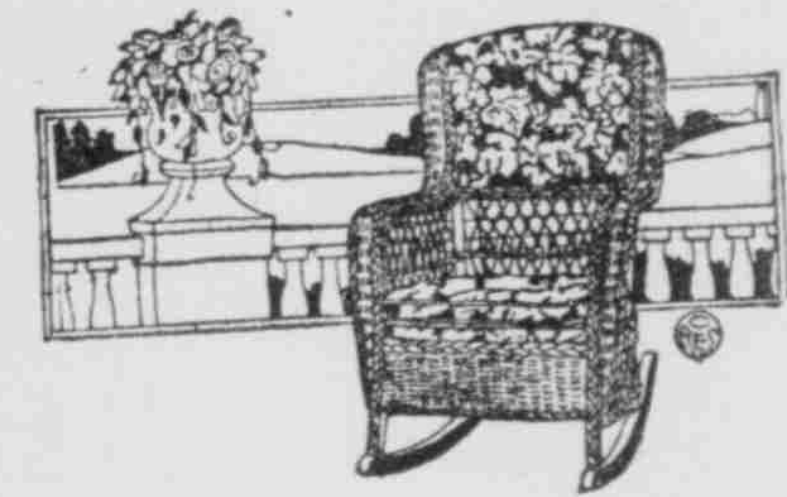
