

SOUTH BEND GETS FIRST GLIMPSE OF OVERALL WEARERS

Members of Local Bowling Team Wade Through Streets in Denim Suits.

South Bend's loop district got its first glimpse of the overall enthusiasts Saturday night, and although the more conservative paraded promenade on downtown thoroughfares evidenced considerable surprised interest, the movement against the H. C. L. lost nothing by the inaugural appearance of the overall safety.

The denim pioneers were members of the South Bend Watch company bowling league on their way to attend the annual spring banquet of the league held at the Kable banquet hall.

Some of the more diffident members carried their overalls under their arms and donned them after reaching the hall, but the sponsors of the movement had the courage of their convictions, and came from homes attired in the one-piece denim costumes.

Police Want Overalls.
Another development in the campaign was the action decided upon by some members of the police department in starting a movement to allow patrolmen to wear khaki or some other inexpensive garments this summer instead of the high-priced uniforms which have been suggested to the board of safety.

The policemen are said to be unwilling to pay the 30 per cent increase in price of the summer uniforms, which were considered by the board at their meeting Friday afternoon, and it is understood that a delegation of the men will ask the board at their next meeting to adopt uniforms of denim or khaki material, which they claim can be purchased from local manufacturers for a very reasonable price.

Movement Spreading.
The movement is spreading rapidly in local factories according to reports last night. A petition circulated in the South Bend Watch Co. factory and office, was signed by 250 men who pledged themselves to wear overalls for a definite period of time to bring down prices in clothes to where woolen garments are more acceptable.

Over 200 employees of the Oliver Chilled Plov Co. are said to have joined the movement Saturday, and a club of 200 members has been organized by the men for the purpose of the Studebaker corporation. The new club hopes to gain recruits not only from the Studebaker corporation but from other industrial and business concerns. The club expects to appear in their new uniforms Tuesday morning.

Johnny Keane, an actor appearing in a song and dance number at the Orpheum theater, received a big hand at the Saturday night performance when he appeared in overalls instead of his regular stage costume.

New Attraction.
The manager of the Oliver Style Shop said last night that he is sponsoring an "All Overall Bazaar" made of khaki and denim, which will be seen Sunday on the streets in the loop district and also at the Orpheum theater.

C. K. Kuehne, of the Lee Mercantile Co., told The News-Times Saturday that his concern has been receiving telegrams from all parts of the country inquiring about shipments of the one-piece overalls. The inquiries were received Saturday from Jackson, Miss., and Charlotte, N. C., and other telegrams have been pouring in during the last week from cities of the south, where the movement started, and where it is spreading most rapidly.

He said that most retail dealers have fairly large stocks of denim and khaki suits on hand, but that the factory supplies of denim goods was low on account of the shortage in this fabric. Khaki and pongee are being used by many factories in place of denim, Mr. Kuehne asserted.

FIRE CAUSES BIG LOSS IN GOSHEN

Hawks Furniture Co. Sustains Loss of \$50,000. Origin Unknown.

Special to The News-Times: GOSHEN, Ind., April 17.—Loss estimated at from \$40,000 to \$50,000 resulted when fire damaged the warehouse of the Hawks Furniture company here late Friday night. Ample insurance protection is carried, the factory management announced today. Most of the loss was caused by water coming in contact with the finished product—500 pieces of bed room furniture.

The blaze, discovered by Milton L. Miller, factory night watchman, is believed to have originated from spontaneous combustion in a vent pipe from the spraying room. The pipe, it is said, had become clogged with sediments from paints and varnishes. The fire broke out on the roof of the three-story brick structure, located on the east bank of the hydraulic canal and opposite the factory. The warehouse is divided into three parts each separated by a fireproof wall.

Discover Fire.
When discovered the fire was burning briskly on the roof of the middle section. The fire department was rendered next to helpless through lack of sufficient length to reach the top of the building. Through the perfect working of the factory sprinkler system, the fire was extinguished, but not until after the warehouse had been flooded. As much of the finished product

MOVE RESTRICTION ON GASOLINE SALE

Chamber of Commerce Man Predicts Break in Freight Situation.

Removal of the restrictions on sales of gasoline and a freer movement of freight on all railroad lines here were indications Saturday of the breaking up of the transportation tangle which has handicapped industry for the past few weeks.

The standard oil company announced Saturday that their filling stations had received shipments of gasoline sufficient to supply consumers for some time and that there was now no restrictions on the number of gallons which could be purchased. The former rule limited the amount to three gallons for drivers of all machines except trucks used for hauling merchandise.

Predict Finish.
J. R. Brenner, head of the transportation department of the Chamber of Commerce, said last night that the freight situation here was greatly improved. He predicted that the disintegration of the railroad strike in this section would occur early next week.

None of the employees of the roads here are now out on strike, but freight movement has been badly hampered by the action of the "outlaw" strikers in nearby shipping points.

The freight embargo on the New York Central lines, which has been in effect for several days, will probably be lifted within the next two or three days, according to advices from railroad circles last night.

IRON PROSPECTING MAY BE RESUMED

Reports Have Aroused Much Interest Throughout State Say Those Interested.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 16.—Recent reports that iron prospecting may be resumed in Greene county has aroused much interest in the state. According to reports on file in the division of geology of the state conservation department, the iron ore deposits of Greene county rank second in the state in extent and volume. Martin county has the greatest amount of iron ore, but its deposits are not as accessible as those of Greene county.

The records show from 1840 to 1860 the deposits were worked in a limited way and utilized two blast furnaces built for smelting. Various attempts were made later to revive interests in iron in that county. In 1863 a railway company obtained options of several thousand acres of land and began prospecting for iron but abandoned the project a short time later. Following these failures officials of the department of geology had pronounced the industry in Indiana as being "dead," but declared there were possibilities in a number of Indiana counties.

Business Men Go Through Course of Scoutcraft

There was a nodding and a whispering among the trees in Rum Village Saturday afternoon. Rushes looked askance, and green things poked their heads higher above the leaves in an effort to get the proper share of unusual activities.

Some 25 South Bend business men, garbed in everything from the modish and surely chic overall to the one-time cast of regulation uniform common to the recent altercation with the defunct central powers, were getting a first hand and practical lesson in Scoutcraft under the direction of Joe Taylor, Scout organizer for South Bend.

"When Men Were Men."
Some may have judged a bit, but most of the men accomplished the impossible of lighting a fire with two lone slumps of the safety variety, and erect and poleaxes (at \$6.25 a bushel) were crooked and enjoyed despite the absence of all manner of utensils of the culinary department. No shavings, leaves or dried grass were permitted in the fire building.

Not only this, but the staid South Bend business men who have undertaken scout duty, cavorted about in the forests, played games common to the army recreation periods and the college campus. It was then that scout fires bore low, and the branches of majestic maples and elms, to say nothing of gnarled and knotted oaks, nudged each other in glee.

Mr. Taylor was enthusiastic over the results of the trip. He sees a great future for Scoutcraft in St. Joseph county.

100 Physicians Pledge Aid.
Through the efforts of Dr. E. J. Leut, 150 South Bend physicians and surgeons have been pledged to assist in instructing young America in the mysteries of first aid to the injured. Classes will be opened very soon, and complete instruction given in regard to stopping blood flow, resuscitating the drowning or gassed, preparing fractures for expert attention, and relieving pain. These classes will be constructive.

The older boys will receive this instruction first, and in detail. They will go through what is termed an officers training course, fitting themselves for future efforts as Scout leaders, and to fill temporary vacancies.

Radio work will be a specialty for the older boys. Release from death grips and strangle holds will be taught.

Meeting for Teachers.
The next regular meeting for teachers will be held on Wednesday evening of next week. Scout games will be gone into, knot tying and signaling explained, and Scout games included in. Instruction will be given by Mr. Taylor, Elmer Burnham and K. K. Rockne.
