THREE MILLION CHINESE STUDENTS DECLARE STRIKE

Oppose Teaching Regarding Negotiations With Japan About Shantung.

SHANGHAI, April 19. — Three million students throughout the 14 northern provinces of China went on strike Sunday in protest against the teaching advocating direct negotiations with Japan on the Shantung question, according to reports received here.

The students, who are parading the streets of the principal cities are seeking to enlist the support of trade unionists.

Abrogation of all secret treaties is demanded by the striking students who have promised they will not molest foreigners.

Intense feeling against Japan has marked the attitude of nearly all Chinese students since the Shantung peninsula settlement by the Paris conference. The hatred became crystallized recently when students boycotted Japanese merchants at Poo Chow. Severe disorders marked the boycott.

APPEAL CASE OF WALTER BAKER

Murder Trial Will Be Reviewed By Supreme Court.

The attorneys for Walter Baker, convicted slayer of Carl H. Cook, Laporte groceryman, have filed official notice with County Clerk Warner that an appeal from the judgment rendered in the St. Joseph county circuit court on April 10, has been taken to the supreme court. Baker was convicted and sentenced to die in the electric chair by a jury after a sensational trial heard by Special Judge Hubbard. A motion for a new trial was overruled and the most recent action by the defense is a final effort to secure the convicted murderer from the electric chair.

It is expected that the supreme tribunal will review the evidence and if the verdict of the local court is upheld, an appeal for clemency to Gov. Goodrich will be made.

BANK PRESIDENT WINS POINT OF ERROR

By United Press: WASHINGTON, April 19.—Rep. McFadden, as president of the First National bank of Canton, Pa., in the supreme court today won his suit against John Skelton Williams as comptroller of the currency.

The bank sought to enjoin the comptroller from requiring from it special reports concerning loans which Williams claims he was authorized by law to demand. Lower courts dismissed the proceedings for want of jurisdiction and the appeal was on this point, the supreme court declaring this view was in error.

Country School "Kids" Are Attending Last Week of Session

LEAGUE TO HOLD CONVENTION HERE

Three Day Meeting of State Organization For May 16-17-18.

Rt. Rev. Herman Joseph Alerding, bishop of the Fort Wayne diocese, will celebrate the solemn pontifical high mass at St. Mary's church which will open the convention of the St. Joseph's state league here May 16. The convention will continue three days and approximately 250 men representatives of the 25 state societies will be in attendance, each society being allowed one delegate for every 25 members.

The total enrollment of the organizations is 6,000 and the state officers are Otto Kreuzberger of Evansville, president; Dr. A. W. Miller of Indianapolis, first vice president, and Anton J. Wickman, Indianapolis, secretary.

The program for the three day convention is as follows: Sunday 8 o'clock, assemble at Jefferson hotel and march to St. Mary's hall; 9:30 o'clock, roll call of delegates and presentation of badges; 10 o'clock, pontifical high mass at St. Mary's church, celebrated by Bishop Alerding and German sermon by Rev. Chrysostom Theobald, O. F. M.; 3 o'clock, solemn vespers; 8 o'clock, mass meeting at St. Hedwig's hall, G. A. Farabaugh, chairman. Speakers for Sunday night are Hon. M. G. Gerten, president central Verein, Chicago, and Hon. F. P. Kenkel, K. S. G., director of Central Stelle, St. Louis, Mo.

On Monday there will be solemn requiem mass at St. Mary's church at 8 o'clock and business sessions at 9 and 2 o'clock at St. Mary's hall. Speakers for the mass meeting at 8 o'clock in the evening are Rev. Hy. Hussman, St. Louis, Mo., and Hon. Henry Seyfried of Indianapolis.

The final program on Tuesday includes solemn mass of thanksgiving at St. Mary's church at 8 o'clock; final business session and election of officers at 9 o'clock; at 2 o'clock automobile ride to Notre Dame, St. Mary's and visits to places of interest in South Bend; 4 o'clock, social entertainment.

INSURANCE COMPANY MUST PAY TAXES

WASHINGTON, April 19.—The supreme court today held that upon cash dividends of a mutual life insurance company to its policy holders taxes must be paid by the company under the income tax of 1913. Payment of this class of tax was protected by the Pennsylvania Mutual Life Insurance Co., on the ground that repayments should not be considered as an income under the meaning of the act.

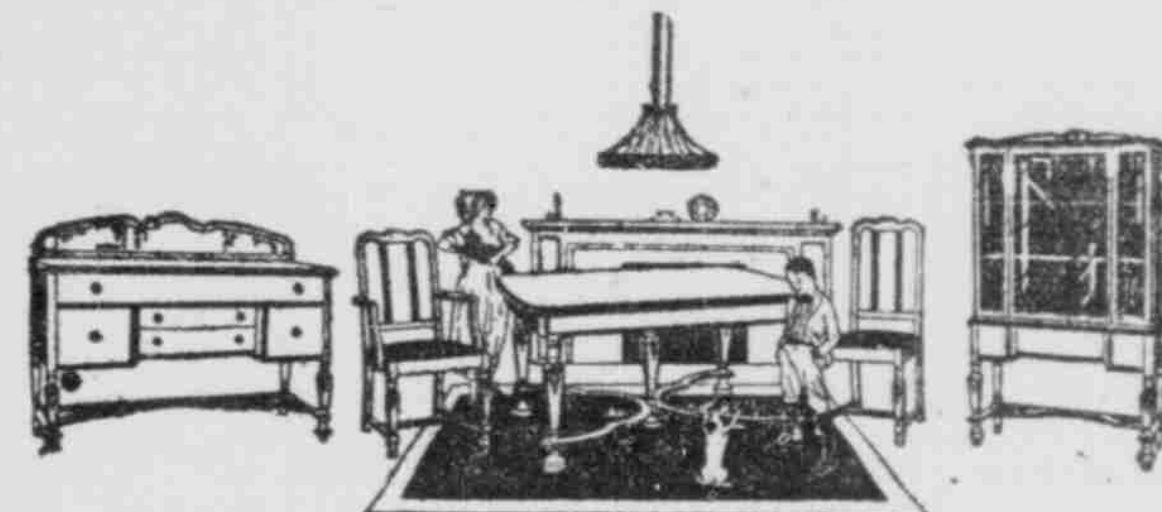
