

WARN KEEPERS OF GAMBLING HOUSES

Police Say Activities Must Stop During Evangelistic Campaign.

Orders to gambling house and other disreputable resort keepers that they either close down their places entirely or operate them with the greatest secrecy during the stay in the city of Evangelist Bob Jones have gone out from police headquarters. It was learned Monday that under no circumstances will any establishment be open for eight.

"We've either got to close up or work so that people think we have closed up," said one well known underworld resort owner Monday. "We've got to wait until this revival is over," he continued.

Fail to Deny Reports. No denial has come from police headquarters that gambling houses and other disreputable resorts have been operating in practically every part of the city, with the downtown district well supplied with these places, including gambling dens, bawdy houses and other like places.

Whether owners of the disreputable resorts will follow the orders of the police authorities to operate with all possible secrecy, or will close down entirely for the next four weeks, was not apparent Monday. It was noted Sunday night, however, that there was not quite the usual activity in a number of the more prominent resorts.

FAIL TO DESIGNATE VARIOUS VOTING PLACES
