

WOOD SUPPORTERS ARE DYING OUT IN ELKHART COUNTY

G. O. P. Voters Are Pushing
Candidacy of Harding
and Lowden.

GOSHEN, Ind., April 19.—Major General Leonard Wood, U. S. A., candidate for the republican nomination for president, will not poll the strength that was expected he would when the primary election is held in Elkhart county two weeks from now. This, according to estimates made here Monday night by republican party leaders. Wood's sentiment, hereabouts, is rapidly dying, while much support is being found for Sen. Harding of Ohio and Gov. Lowden of Illinois.

Discovery is made that Elkhart county farmers are not for Gen. Wood for president, but they are for military men they have no fault to find with Wood, but they do not warm up to him as a candidate for president. Farmers will divide their support between Sen. Harding and Gov. Lowden, it is declared by republicans who are closely in touch with the situation. Sen. Johnson of California has few supporters here, he being regarded as "too radical" for this particular time. Herbert Hoover is deemed as "impossible" by nearly all republican leaders.

Bull Moose Territory.

In 1912 Elkhart county was among the few rural localities where bull moosers outnumbered republicans four to one. Two years later bull moosers were still far in the lead. Under these circumstances it was thought that Elkhart county would swing to Gen. Wood. It is still believed that Wood will poll more votes in Elkhart county than either Sen. Harding or Gov. Lowden, but republicans who think they are able to size up the situation are confident that Wood's vote will not be large enough to give him a majority. Strangely enough some of the former rampant bull moosers are out for Harding.

The republican organization of the county appears to have taken sides with the bull moose. Its vigorous campaign is being waged in his behalf and unless all calculations are upset, Harding is to be reckoned with in the primary here two weeks from tomorrow.

A. Gov. Lowden meeting was held at the Elkhart Y. W. C. A., Monday night, when Mrs. Fletcher Dobyns of Chicago, woman's national chairman of the Lowden campaign, was the speaker.

CONTINUE GAS RATES.
GOSHEN, Ind., April 19.—The Goshen Gas company has been granted permission by the Indiana public service commission to continue in effect for an indefinite period, standard time rates, the same as the provisions of the original order, granted in 1917, were to expire May 1, 1920. The company has made a showing to the state commission

that its expenses are higher than at the time the order was made and under these circumstances the commission has ordered that the rates are to be continued. The company is retaining coke at \$1.50 per ton. At the time the increase in rates was granted, complaint was made that the quality of gas supplied here was not up to standard.

PRESBYTERY OPENS.

GOSHEN, Ind., April 19.—The spring session of the Fort Wayne Presbytery opened here Monday night, at the First Presbyterian church, when Rev. Campbell L. MacKay of Elkhart, the moderator, preached a sermon before a large audience. About 50 delegates, one-half of them ministers, were attending the session, which will close Tuesday night. Elkhart, Lagrange, Noble, St. Joseph, Kosciusko, DeKalb, Whitley, Huntington, Allen, Wells and Adams counties comprise the Fort Wayne Presbytery.

Tuesday night a moderator will be elected to succeed Rev. MacKay of Elkhart and a secretary will be chosen to succeed Rev. C. G. Shirey of Fort Wayne. E. H. McDonald will submit a report for the trustees of the Presbytery and reports will be made on Bristol and Packerton.

NURSE DIES.

GOSHEN, Ind., April 19.—Eliza N. Hale, 75, widow of Henry C. Hale and widely known in this city and surrounding territory as a nurse, died of apoplexy Monday night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. A. J. Quinn, after an illness of five months. Mrs. Hale had lived in Goshen for 29 years.


