BOKITCH THROWS CHICAGO YOUTH

Young Gotch Substitutes for Talaber Who is Ill in Chicago.

Tony Bokitch of Gary demonstrated some real class wrestling ability Monday night at the Century theater in Mishawaka when he threw Young Gotch of Chicago who substituted for Lou Talaber twice in 20 minutes. Bokitch took the first fall in 19 minutes and 50 seconds with a body scissors and bar arm. He won the second fall in 10 minutes and 10 seconds with a crotch hold.

Gotch substituted for Talaber, who is sick in Chicago with pneumonia and displayed some real ability. The match being the best and most evenly contested ever seen in Mishawaka. Gotch broke several very bad arm, wrist and hammer locks while his head scissors punished the likeable Gary youth a great deal. All in all it was a good bout, but not as good as it would have been had Talaber been Bokitch's opponent.

Poor Prelims.
In the preliminary wrestling bouts which were more or less of mediocre quality, mostly less, Don Ross won from Tom Jones of Chicago two out of three falls, taking the first and last fall after conceding the second fall because of Jones' punishing body scissors; Cox won from Smith of Osceola after Smith refused to go after losing the first fall, and Ed Morse of Niles, the 120 lb. man, won from Herman Unk of South Bend three times in seven minutes. He guaranteed to throw Unk three times in 20 minutes, the bout being a handicap affair.

The bout was promoted by Kid Ross, Mishawaka wrestler, and was witnessed by a half filled house.

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THE OVERALL PROPOSITION.

To the Editor:—May I use a few inches of valuable news print space to register a few thoughts relative to the so-called "overall movement?"

It has occurred to me, as it has evidently occurred to many others, (judging by sentiments expressed by every person, without exception, with whom I have talked, that this newest movement will prove nothing more than a fad, and that it will develop into a great economic waste and have the final effect of raising the cost of cotton goods and without having any perceptible effect on present goods prices.

Does any one profess to think that by buying a suit of overalls and wearing them only on special occasions, or once or twice a month, he will thereby make a saving in the wear of his conventional woolen suit, so that he will not need to buy as many woolens and thus cause a drop in the price of wool suits by the force of supply and demand?

I can hardly think any reasonable or reasoning person will conclude that that will be the effect.

No sporadic effort will have the slightest effect to lower the price of woolens, and the only thing I can see as a result is a shortage in overalls and a raise in price of them to the people who have a legitimate use for them.

When a man or a group of men decide that this overall movement is sound economically, and are willing to back their thought with acts, let them don the overalls for other than parade purposes, and refrain absolutely from wearing wool clothes from now until next fall. If they will do that, and there are enough of them, prices of wool clothing will come down, but otherwise not.

It seems to me, however, that the real way to help out the present situation is to wear out our old clothes—by the way old clothes can be made very respectable in appearance by occasional dry cleaning and pressing—and thus effect a real economic saving, for in doing this we are practically increasing the world's supply of wool and, at the same time, we are not cutting down the
