

## Henry and Murphy to Settle Real Grudge Affair Tonight

When the announcer introduces Bill Henry and Teddy Murphy tonight at the Oliver theater in South Bend, northern Indiana, and southern Michigan night fans will have a chance of seeing two of the best featherweights in the game settle a grudge affair. This will be the third and rubber meeting for them. It promises to be no "tango" affair for action galore is going to greet the fans eyes if their statements can be believed.

This pair of steaming feathers have met on many occasions, each having one decision. In their last bout, which was held at Laporte, some few weeks ago, Henry carried off the decision. In doing this he marked up the little stocky boys to such an extent that he could only see out of one headlight. But besides his humbling mark Murphy also suffered greatly from stiff body punches and other hard blows to the face and head.

**Return Match.**  
Immediately Teddy was after Henry for a return match so promoter Sworts of this city quickly signed the two boys to appear here, reasoning what a wonderful bout the two would put up on their third and rubber meeting.

Both Henry and Murphy will arrive in town about noon today. Each is in the pink of condition and each is confident of winning. They have trained hard for this bout, it means a deal to each in the way of lining up a bout with Johnny Kilbane, featherweight champion.

Fans who saw Murphy outpoint the Texas Kid here a little more than a month ago will remember Murphy as being a scientific fighter who depended more upon his boxing ability to win his decisions rather than trying to put over a haymaker. Since then Murphy has changed.

Last week he was beaten by Matt Brock of Cleveland in a ten round bout. Brock is one of the toughest boys in the ring, having met such men as Benny Leonard, Lew Tendler, Willie Jackson, Johnny Kilbane, and a host of other well known fighters. He is as good as the man named above, and has put splendid battle with all of them, earning a draw with champion Benny Leonard. Brock is reputed to be one of the toughest hitters in the game. However, Teddy withstood his assault and repaid him blow for blow, never flinching and since then he has decided that Brock's tactics are the best to win fights with.

South Bend will be the first city to see him start out with his new method and if Teddy is right Henry will probably be the first victim of Matt's knockout attack.

Henry, no slouch and he will give Murphy enough trouble to worry him considerably, if not to such an extent that he may, instead of Murphy, go away with the victory hanging on his belt.

There will also be three other boxers, each from a different round bout between Kid Gleason of Niles and Blackie Ritchie of Chicago, the second a six round bout, and the semi-windup will be an eight round bout between Spider Kelly of Milwaukee and Johnny Hagen of Detroit.
