COAL DEPOSITS WILL SOON BE OPENED.

Secretary of the interior Payne has approved rules and regulations for prospecting for and leasing of coal deposits under the act of congress, approved Feb. 25, 1920. The act provides for the disposition of all coal deposits owned by the United States except in national parks, military or marine reservations and in the Appalachian forest reserve.

The geological survey has classified 30,000,000 acres of public lands as containing deposits of coal and an area of 40,000,000 acres, part of which undoubtedly contains such deposits, is awaiting classification. The coal varies from low-grade lignite to very high quality of bituminous coal.

The regulations do not apply to Alaska, where deposits are leased under an earlier act.


