

SNOBERRY IN ARMY HIT HARD JOLT BY HOUSE AMENDMENT

Many Instances of Class Distinction Cited During Debate Bill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 21.—Snoberry in the United States army was hit a hard jolt when the house of representatives on a roll call by a vote of 161 to 105 nays ordered the army appropriation bill resubmitted to the committee on military affairs with instructions to incorporate the anti-snoberry amendment of Rep. Fields of Kentucky and report the bill with the amendment back to the house forthwith. The house then passed the army appropriation bill with the Fields amendment included.

The Fields amendment is as follows: "Provided, that no part of the funds herein appropriated shall be expended in the payment of the salary of any officer of the army of the United States who shall issue, or cause to be issued, any order, written or verbal, establishing social distinction or preventing social intercourse between officers and enlisted men of said army when not on military duty when such order was not made by law or general executive order."

Furious Debate.

In the debate many instances of snoberry were cited, as, for instance, when private soldiers were refused permission to attend theaters where officers were present or to sleep or eat in the same building.

Rep. Kearns of Ohio told of an occasion when he made a visit of inspection at Fort Myer, Va. A tour of the camp was made in an automobile and a private soldier acted as chauffeur. When lunch time came the party went to the only restaurant and to the congressman's surprise the officers in the party refused to let the private soldier dine with them. Kearns said he remonstrated.

Kearns Leads Fight.

"Don't you suppose he gets hungry the same as the rest of us?" Kearns asked. The matter was finally compromised by the private soldier eating at a separate table after Kearns had threatened to leave the place forthwith.

Kearns, who is a member of the military committee, broke away from the committee and led the fight that put across the Fields amendment. He carried a large Republican vote for the amendment, including all Ohio members except Rep. Fess. Rep. Stephens of Cincinnati, who formerly was a captain in the national guard, voted heartily for the amendment.

"We ought to have more democracy in the army," he declared. If the senate takes out the amendment Fields will lead another fight in the house when the bill comes back from conference.

PROHIBITION INCREASED DEMAND FOR LINEN

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 21.—Prohibition has increased the demand for linens, according to Frank H. Hartless, Chicago, secretary of the Linen Supply Association of America, which held its annual convention in Louisville recently. When the saloons went out of business, Mr. Hartless said, concerns selling linens believed demand for their products would slump. Presently they were surprised to note, he stated, a greatly increased demand which he attributed to myriads of ice cream parlors and soft drink places which sprang into existence.

MECHANICS, FARMERS AND LABORERS WED

MUNCIE, Ind., April 21.—More young men engaged in mechanical work, farming and laboring in Muncie and thereabouts are getting married than clerks, book keepers and others interested in lighter work, according to figures taken from the marriage license records for the first three months of 1920.

There were 170 marriage licenses issued and of that number 127 were obtained by mechanics, farmers and laborers. The laborers led, with 75 licenses. Mechanics followed with 51 and the farmers numbered 24.

BUILDING DELAY BECOMING SERIOUS

Public Works and Utilities
Constructed Faster Than
Houses.

NEW YORK, April 21.—Delay in releasing the housing shortage all over the country is greater than in any other form of building construction, according to review of building contracts issued today by the D. W. Dodge company. Public works, industrial buildings and public utilities are being constructed much faster than residences and are less affected by high prices, high wages and shortage of material.

Contracts awarded for residential buildings in the first quarter of this year vary from 14 to 22 percent of total building contracts in different sections of the country. Normally residences account for about 30 percent of the contracts, and in view of existing needs, the review says, residences should represent about 40 percent of the total construction.

Acute Situation.

In New York state and northern New Jersey 14 percent of the contracts in the first quarter of the year represented residential buildings, "a matter of serious concern," says the review, "as it is probable that the housing shortage is more acute in this territory than anywhere else."

In the territory east of the Missouri river and north of the Ohio residential construction was 19 percent of the total, in New England, 23 percent; in the district of Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington, 22 percent; in the Pittsburgh district, 13 percent; in the central west, 18 percent, and in the northwest 19 percent.

In no district is contemplated building construction as high as 30 percent.
