

RULING BY JUDGE FUNK IS REVERSED BY SUPREME COURT

State Tribunal Holds Frank J. Mayer and Others Liable as Sureties.

A decision against the First National bank of South Bend by Judge Funk in the circuit court in the case instituted by the bank against Frank J. Mayer, Jr., and others was reversed by the Indiana state supreme court Friday at Indianapolis, and the defendants were held liable for the obligations incurred as sureties for the Modern Specialty Manufacturing Co., a South Bend corporation which went into the hands of a receiver several years ago.

The plea of the defendants that inasmuch as F. G. Eberhart, of Mishawaka, one of the original sureties of the defunct company, had been discharged from the obligations, the remaining signers were also free from liability, was upheld by Judge Funk when the suit was first heard here. An appeal to the supreme court was filed by the plaintiffs and the long drawn out legal battle came to an end Friday with the decision of the state high tribunal. A similar action taken by the South Bend National bank is still pending in the courts.

The original debt amounted to \$2,000, the First National bank holding \$15,000 of the paper while the South Bend National bank loaned \$5,000 to the defunct concern. Since the specialty manufacturing company failed, most of this obligation has been cleared, Mr. Eberhart being instrumental in paying a part of the claim, say the bank officials. The court's action against Mayer et al was taken when the remainder of the sureties fled to reimburse the bank for its loss, according to the original complaint.

FILES DAMAGE SUIT.

Robert McKenzie has brought suit for \$5,000 against Walker D. Miles, director general of the division of government control of the roads and the Grand Trunk Railway Co. for injuries alleged to have been sustained by the plaintiff during his time of employment with the company. The complaint says that on the night of Oct. 3, 1919, the plaintiff while employed as holder of a station stopped and fell over a heavy car chain laid across the track and sustained permanent injuries which seriously impaired his health.
