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BASEBALL LIGHTS DIFFER ON DOPE

Wiseheads Express Opinion
on Respective Value of
Batting and Pitching.

NEW YORK, April 23.—Wise heads of baseball differ on the respective value of batting and pitching.

Pat Moran, one of the brainiest men in baseball, prefers a big stable of pitchers. John McGraw rates the pitching staff at close to 75 percent of the club's strength. Kid Gleason leans a little bit to hitting as the most valuable asset.

Other managers differ. Results so far this season give some interesting evidence. Take the Detroit Tigers, one of the heaviest hitting teams in the American league, a club with the greatest slugging outfit in baseball with the champion of the league, and a quintet of regular every-day .300 sluggers.

The Tigers are in last place. They haven't won a game this season. Cobb, Flagstead, Veach, Heilmann and Bush can knock the cover off the ball, to no avail. Detroit isn't getting the pitching and while these sluggers are pounding out hits by stocks, the weaker hitting opposition is having a similar carnival on the gift of wild batters.

Miserable pitching is keeping Jennings in the cellar. He hasn't had a top-notch staff for years. Detroit annually has been picked as a run-off anner-up when the dopesters run over the "murderers' row" in the lineup, but the Tigers have consistently failed a victim to the pitching malady.

PLANS FOR CYCLE TRYOUT IS MADE

Teams for Olympic Games
Will be Chosen at Meet
in June.

By Associated Press: NEW YORK, April 23.—Plans for arrangements for the holding of cycling tryouts for the selection of track and road race riders to represent the United States at the Olympic games in Belgium were discussed here Friday by the executive committee for cycling of the American Olympic committee.

This committee comprises R. J. Kelsey, Walter Rineck, Harold Dobbie and Walter A. Bardgett.

As the majority of the amateur riders are in the east it was decided to hold the track tryouts at New York, N. Y., as early as possible in June. There are four track events in the Olympic program ranging from 1,000 metres to 50 kilometres and the road race will be over a distance of 175 kilometres.

Several tryouts for the road event will be held in different sections of the country. These elimination tests will be held at New York, Baltimore, Buffalo, Pittsburgh, Worcester, Mass., Birmingham, Ala., Salt Lake City, St. Louis, Omaha and Stockton, Calif.
