HOLD SIXTEEN IN CAPITAL RIOT PROBE

Indianapolis Mobs Said to Have Attempted to Lynch Negro.

By United Press: INDIANAPOLIS, April 23.—Sixteen men and boys are under arrest following what is said to have been an attempt to lynch William Ray, 19 years old, negro, confessed slayer of Martha Huff, 14 years old, a white girl, whose body was found in Eagle Creek Tuesday.

One negro was shot and slightly wounded Thursday night.

A crowd estimated at about 3,000 gathered in the neighborhood of the court house at about 8 o'clock and some yelled they would lynch the negro.

The police formed guard lines at each street and alley leading to the jail and police headquarters building and no person was permitted to pass except on orders from a captain or lieutenant.

Chief of Police Jerry Kinney took personal charge.

Arrest Alleged Rioters.

At 8:30 o'clock the police started making arrests and continued arresting alleged rioters until 11 o'clock, 15 being arrested.

The only serious trouble occurred in the rear of the Severin hotel at 18:45 o'clock.

Many of the men and boys who

had gathered at the court house earlier in the night, had gone to that neighborhood to get on a street car for home.

Suddenly a fight started on Georgia street.

Some say a negro tried to cut a white man with a knife. Leo Harris, 19 years old, a negro, started to run and it is alleged that John J. Gray, 37 years old, of Louisville, Ky., fired two shots at him, one striking the negro in the left hip.

Chicago Negro.

William Ray, for whom the mob was believed to be seeking, came to Indianapolis from Chicago about three weeks ago and has been employed in this city. He is 19 years old and married. The crime for which he is held without bond was committed late Monday afternoon.

He is said to have made a written statement in which he told how he enticed the girl from her home with the promise of new clothes and took her to a lonely spot on the banks of Eagle Creek west of the city. In the alleged confession he said she screamed when he attempted to embrace her and that he stabbed her 13 times in the neck to silence her.

Later he threw her body in the swollen waters of the stream.

The body was found Tuesday evening and a long search for the negro who committed the crime resulted in the arrest shortly after midnight Thursday morning of Ray. A bloody penknife was found in his pocket. He was positively identified as the man who enticed the Huff girl from her home by her step-sister. At 2:30 o'clock he is said to have made his written confession, which was witnessed by four police officers.
