ALBANY, N. Y., April 24.—The assembly rules committee today had under consideration the Walker bill which allows sale of 2.75 percent beer in New York state. The bill passed the senate last night by a vote of 27 to 23.

The senate also passed a bill permitting local option on liquor in cities.

The Sutherland bill allowing sale of four percent beer and 12 percent wine was defeated.

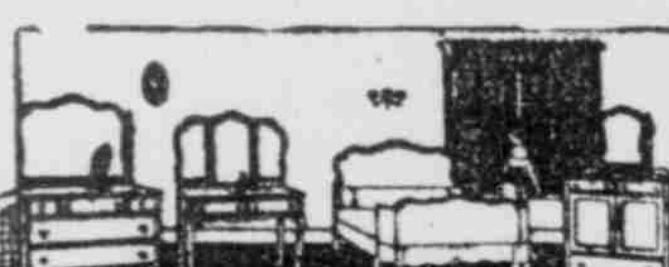

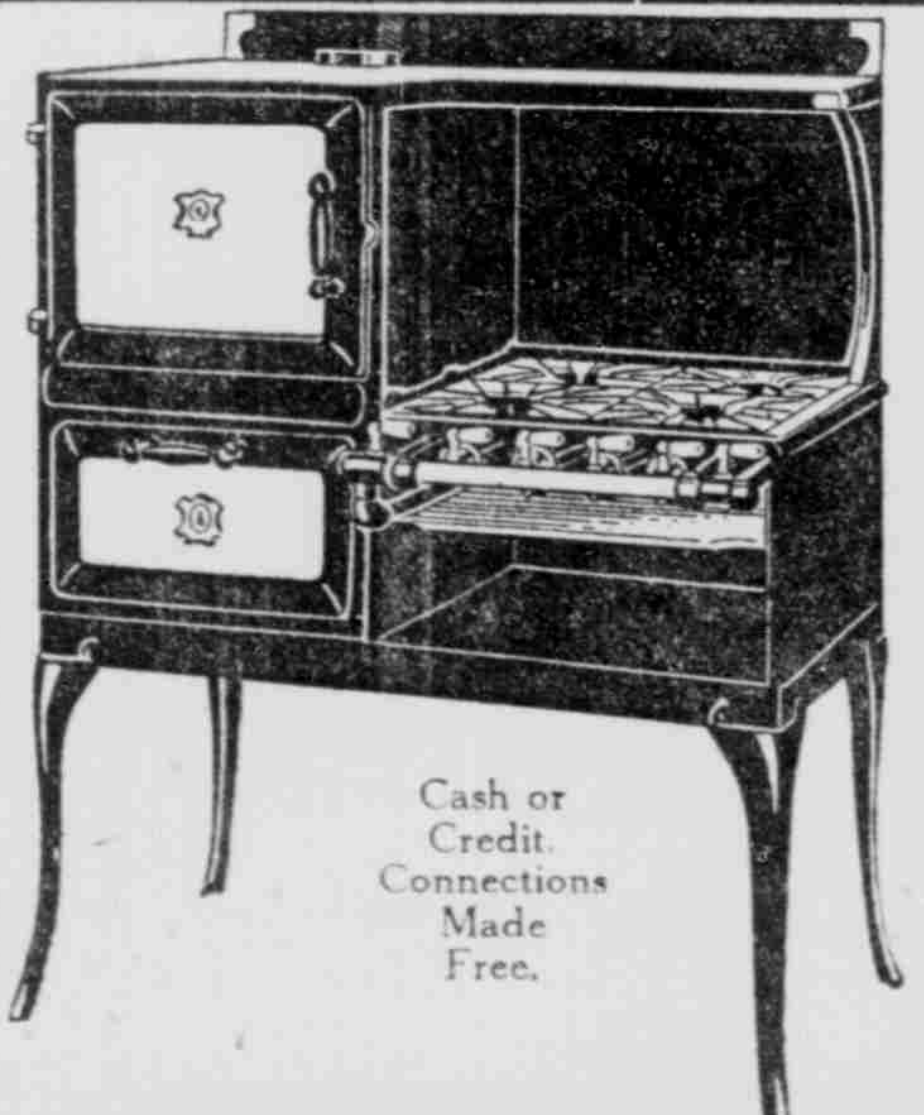
