

# Track Athletes Shatter Four Records in Iowa

## TRACK RECORDS GO IN DRAKE RELAYS; NOTRE DAME THIRD

Iowa State University Wins the Two Mile Relay Race in Fast Time.

DES MOINES, Ia., April 24.—Four previous records of the Drake relay meets were broken today at the 11th meet.

Iowa State won the two-mile relay in 7:33 1-5, which is one-fifth more than the world's record.

Higgins, one of the Iowa men, stumbled over the curbing and lost a fraction of a second in that race. The former record for the two-mile made here was eight minutes flat by Illinois in 1914.

Scholz, of Missouri, was winner of the 100-yard dash, his time being 9:45, the same in which he made it when he won the race two years ago. Illinois was the second section of the one-mile relay, which began at 3:21 1-5, the former record being 3:21 4-5. Illinois also took the four-mile university.

Cedar Rapids, Iowa, clipped one second off the best time of the meets here for the two-mile high school by winning in 8:33 4-5. The same school also reduced the previous record for the high school medley by finishing in 6:51 3-5.

The old record is 6:56, in 1915. Coe College took the first of the meet, and the challenging Shamrock IV is rapidly increasing and all three yachts are expected to put overboard within the next few weeks.

The resolution is scheduled to take the water either May 3 or 4. The date was settled last fall, being governed by the tide at Bristol.
