

Track Athletes Shatter Four Records in Iowa

TRACK RECORDS GO IN DRAKE RELAYS; NOTRE DAME THIRD

Iowa State University Wins the Two Mile Relay Race in Fast Time.

By Associated Press: DES MOINES, Ia., April 24.—Four previous records of the Drake relay meets were broken today at the 11th meet.

Iowa state won the two-mile university in 7:53.1-5, which is one-fifth more than the world's record. Higgins, one of the Iowa men, stumbled over the curb and lost a fraction of a second in that race. The former record for the two-mile made here was eight minutes flat by Illinois in 1914.

Scholz, of Missouri, again was winner of the 100-yard dash, his time being 1:03.4-5, the same in which he made it when he won the race two years ago. Illinois was the second runner in the one-mile university in 3:21.1-5, the former record being 3:21.4-5. Illinois also took the four-mile university.

Cedar Rapids, Iowa, clipped one second off the best time of the meets here for the two-mile high school by winning in 8:33.4-5. The same school also reduced the previous record for the high school medley by finishing in 6:51.3-5. The old record is 6:56, in 1916. Coe college took two events of the meet, winning the one-mile college and one-half mile college.
