

Local High Wins Track Meet

SOUTH BEND HIGH WINS TRACK MEET

Swamp Goshen in Dual Track Meet. Capt. Thompson Stars in 440.

GOSHEN, Ind., April 24.—South Bend high school path artists had little trouble in disposing of Goshen high school in a dual track meet held here Saturday afternoon by the score of 74½ to 27½. Warsaw was expected to compete in the meet but failed to appear. The South Bend squad had things all their way in the track events, but were weak in the field events, the locals placing their only firsts in the high and broad jumps.

Cleo Wedel was the high point man of the meet, making 15 points, although the running of Capt. Thompson of the Orange and Blue squad was by far the feature of the meet. Thompson won both the 200 and the 440, leaving all his opponents trailing the dust. From the form he showed sport critics expect him to do big things in the Northern Indiana meet this year. Stoutenour was the high man for the locals, tallying half of the points.

Maxey, the South Bend distance man, showed excellent form by coping both the mile and the half mile. He would undoubtedly have made much better time had he been pressed to any extent. Wedel and Sluss showed well in the hurdles, running a tie in the high, while Wedel took first in the low. Smith, also a South Bend low hurdler, ran well but was disqualified.

In the field events Sluss took the shot put, while Raiston and Wedel tied in the pole vault. Stoutenour of Goshen won the broad jump with a leap of 17 feet 11 inches, and Wilkinson, also of Goshen, won the high jump by clearing the bar at 5 feet. South Bend won the half mile relay. Capt. Thompson who ran anchor for the Orange and Blue finished 25 yards ahead of his man.

No exceedingly fast time, distances or heights, were made during the meet, but on the whole the South Bend squad looks like a sure winner if they develop in the field events and cut down their time in the track events a little. The summary:

AMERICANS SCORE FIRST VICTORY IN OLYMPIC CONTEST

Hockey Team Skates Rings Around Opponents and Score at Will.

ANTWERP, April 24.—The American hockey team won an easy victory this afternoon over the Swiss seven by a score of 29 to 0. This was America's first participation in the seventh Olympic games.

From the very outset the Americans took the offensive, scoring first goal within two minutes. UMPIRES ENFORCE PITCHER'S RULES

Impossible to Estimate Effect of New Ruling on Battle Averages.

United Press Staff Correspondent. NEW YORK, April 24.—No riots, bloodshed or fatal trimmings have attended the enforcement of the new pitching rules.

Hurlers of both leagues are keeping so close to the law that very few complaints have been made. The Boston Red Sox in a game a few days ago with the Yanks, accused Bob Shawkey of doctoring the ball but the umpires could find no evidence.

What effect the ban of freak deliveries has had in increasing batting is impossible to estimate so early in the season. However, one result is apparent—the game has not been speeded up.

Two Hour Average. The games so far this season have averaged two hours and ten minutes. Rube Benton and Rixey went through the fastest game of the season in one hour and twenty-five minutes. The longest was played by the Cleveland Indians and the Tigers, a nine inning game in three hours and four minutes.

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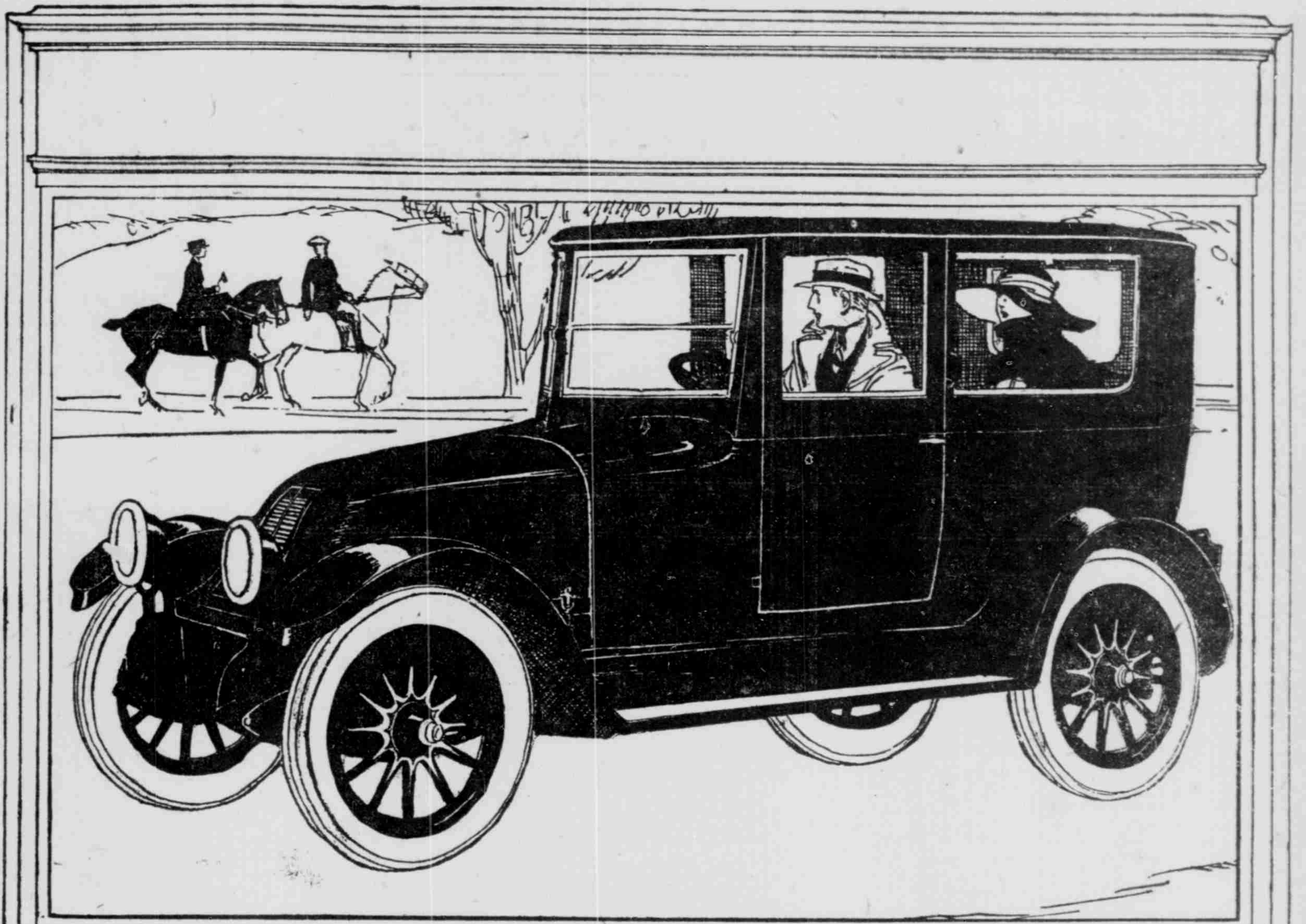
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
