LONDON, April 24.—Publication of the marriage ban on bigamy, says Sir F. A. Bosanquet, who advocates changing Britain's marriage laws so that all parties affected by an intended marriage would be properly notified.

"If our marriage laws were so amended," says Bosanquet, "as to require a really public notice which would be given to the parties concerned with the parties a reasonable time before a marriage, there would be fewer undesirable and improvident marriages and still fewer bigamists."



