Hendrix Loses Pitching Duel to Adams by Wild Toss in Ninth Inning.

CHICAGO, April 25.—Pittsburgh defeated Chicago, 4 to 1, in a 15-inning pitching duel between Claude Hendrix and Babe Adams.

The visitors won the game when Hendrix weakened and started the 15th inning by walking McKeechie, later allowing hits by Caton, Lee and Carey. Hendrix, who doubled in the third inning and scored Chicago's lone run with the aid of a hit and a sacrifice, tossed the game into a tie in the ninth by letting Carey take two bases when he threw his grounder wild to first.
